

Thanks to a grant from the RLC Foundation, an annual lecture series has been established in memory of our former Lead Pastor, Dr. Palmer Gedde. One of Pastor Gedde's passions was adult education, so each year this lecture series will bring top-notch theological speakers to the Tri-Cities to share practical insights that will enrich the spiritual lives of individuals and congregations.

Have you heard of ShareFest?

I'd like to introduce you to a Christian community service movement called ShareFest. This movement may be new to you but it is old hat to me and has been around the Tri-Cities area for 5 years now. I've been participating in the ShareFest movement for over 8 years now. Back in Torrance I was on the local ShareFest Advisory Board and served informally as the Executive Director's Spiritual Director (our offices were next to one another). I was very excited when I decided to accept the call to Richland Lutheran to find out ShareFest was already active in this community. Recently I met with one of the Tri-Cities organizers and agreed to help here in Richland with organizing projects. Here's the short history of ShareFest:

Just a few years ago, the idea of an event like ShareFest was only a dream among a small group of pastors in Central Arkansas who desperately wanted to find a way for the church to demonstrate with their actions what they had been declaring with their words. It was this conviction, that they needed to provide proof of the gospel not just proclamation, which provided the biblical and philosophical foundation

Now, ShareFest has become a bridge from the Church to the Community. A living, breathing bridge constructed of people from over 100 other churches that have begun to understand when it comes to sharing God's love...actions speak much louder than words. How did they get to that place? In January 1998, thirty one pastors, representing diverse backgrounds and denominational traditions, traveled to Ozark Conference Center for a four day Pastors' Prayer Summit. As they worshipped and prayed together, they experienced a deeper brokenness, repentance, and humility before God. Relationships were reconciled and strengthened. It was out of these new relationships, an new conviction, and a fresh move of God's Spirit, the first ShareFest was birthed in November 1999.

It was a vision to unite together in a strategic and visible demonstration of Christ's love for our community through a joint service and worship event. In a transforming moment at the first ShareFest Celebration, pastors from many denominations stood together before the 6,000 people at Alltel Arena and offered a public prayer of confession and commitment. They confessed how their jealousy, pride, disunity, and prayerlessness had hindered their effectiveness in loving their community and proclaiming the good new of Jesus Christ. They made a fresh commitment to promote unity, to pray, and to serve.

Since that first year, ShareFest has grown beyond a once-a-year service event. It has truly become the catalyst that has helped many churches connect with their communities and to become more outwardly focused throughout the year. New relationships have been established between churches, schools, community leaders, and non-profit organizations. This simple idea of uniting together with other churches to demonstrate the love of Christ is now spreading to many ShareFest cities all across the country.

ShareFest in the Tri-Cities describes what they are trying to do this way, "The idea is simple. Assemble as many churches as possible and light up (Matthew 5:16) the Tri-City community with as many good works as possible in a concentrated period of time. Don't preach. Prove! Serve! Give! Love! Put flesh on the Word of God. Make it tangible, observable, and undeniable. Their vision is to "Demonstrate the love of Christ in the Tri-City community, Unite the Christian churches of the Tri-Cities, Meet the needs of the community, and Live out Scripture." I am in the process of working with the Outreach Teams here at RLC to participate in this event and we covet your prayers as we move forward and outward to proclaim the Gospel of Christ and when necessary use words!

Early Christian Worship

Last month, we looked at who it is we worship and why we worship. This month, we will begin to look at how we worship by taking a look at Christianity's earliest gatherings for worship. We will go back to our roots and look at what was happening after Christ's Resurrection and Ascension. What was it like to gather as Christians? Where did the early Christians gather? What did their services look like?

When we look to the scriptures, we see in Acts and in Paul's letters that there were many places of worship in those first years. The first meeting place was in an upper room in Jerusalem where prayer and supplications were made by the disciples. The second place was at the temple, where Peter preached his sermon and thousands of people were converted. The third place was at the house of Mary when Peter was liberated from prison. We see that many people had gathered and were praying (Acts 12:12). Paul also makes special mention of the 'house church' in Rom. 16:5. There was also the Jewish Synagogue. Paul's custom in his travels was to first seek out the Jewish synagogues and proclaim the Gospel of Jesus Christ there – that the Messiah and Savior had come in the person of Jesus Christ. If people heeded Paul's message, the Jewish Synagogue would soon turn into a Christian gathering place. If the people rejected Paul's message, a group usually would split off from the Jewish congregation and seek houses or other places to meet. The fifth place of Christian worship were buildings designated as Christian churches. Although we don't know specifically when this began to happen, as the church grew, houses were no longer large enough to hold the entire congregation. Whenever this began to happen, it is clear from 1 Cor. 11: 20-22 that Paul is implying that the Corinthian church was meeting somewhere other than a house.

Whether Christians met in secrecy or publicly largely depended on the amount of persecution from place to place. In times of persecution, Christians met secretly; in better times, Christians met openly and invited unbelievers.

Christian worship derived much of its form from traditional Jewish worship. There was gathering, hearing and teaching / preaching of the Word, songs and prayers. There were distinct differences from Jewish worship, however, beginning with the message of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Baptism was also a huge part of early Christian worship. So, too, was the Eucharistic meal that Jesus instituted. What we see from the earliest comments on Christian worship is that there were two distinct parts to worship: The Word and The Eucharistic meal. Next month we will take a closer look at these two distinct parts of worship and take a look at how they have changed and remained the same through the centuries.

Correspondence from Pastor Toplaan in Estonia

The following is a letter from Pastor Toplaan, of Holy Jakob, written to and translated by Hans Toffer.

Dear Hans,

Thank you for the nice letter. I am glad to hear you got a new associate pastor, Steve Ernst. Many thanks to the Richland Lutheran Church congregation for its financial gift.

Towards the end of 2010, the Puha congregation was active with adding additional space for congregational activities. We have been busy with a large project whose scope includes rebuilding a basement/cellar located next to the church. The structure is in very poor condition. We would like to refurbish it to be able to establish in the next year, a spiritual legacy center for the Puha district. It would be possible to gather the history of the district and congregation for future research and for historical preservation. It could be possible to create the Center's own newsletter for information and a database. We have formed an initial planning committee whose task is to oversee the planned activities. When the building is refurbished, we would display part of our heritage. The building could also contain local tourist information. The official name would be Puha District Historic Room.

The mess hall of the camp needs an extension of the roof so the temporary summer rain showers cannot interrupt activities. Next to the mess hall, we built a new room, which we call the game room. One of the bigger events the congregation is to prepare the game room for the summer solstice festivities. We bought a new ping pong table in addition to other table games. The room is very spacious and pleasing, and can mainly be used during the warm season. This room can also be used by the local youth. We have completed a big task on the landscaping around the church. We cut down 22 trees that were old and represented a safety hazard and we also seeded more grassy areas. Next to the old parsonage, we built an old fashioned swing. Next spring, we plan to rebuild the old sauna building. We will install 2 new modern bathrooms and two guest rooms for visitors.

Along with this planning for the future, we need to fix the old parsonage roof and the extension of the mess hall roof. If not done, we may have problems during the winter

The prayer room is above the sacristy and can be used during the warmer weather. There is a lot of use when the youth camps are in session. The confirmation class had eight members and the active congregational membership is 250.

It would be nice if you could visit this coming summer. We welcome you any time you can come. In June, we have the most youth camps. July and August dates are more open.




