Her name is Nadiyah



The Annoor Hospital is part of a secured compound in Mafraq, Jordan. The hospital and its surroundings are truly an oasis in the desert. It is at this hospital that people of little means are treated with love and respect for diseases such as tuberculosis, cardio pulmonary disease, and asthma. There are two babies who were admitted recently with a failure-to-thrive diagnosis – both of whom are doing really well and will someday return to their Bedouin families. But not all children will go home — children like a little two-year old brought to this hospital 10 years ago when it became apparent she had suffered brain damage because of a domestic incident.

God brought me and Nadiyah together less than 24 hours after Mike and I arrived in Jordan. We connected instantly. She spends her days sitting on a chair and scooting herself around her room, looking for anything to throw. When I met her her, she looked at me and said "Up," so I stood in front of her, offering my hands to see what she could do. She pulled herself up and began to shuffle toward the door. We walked outside, up and down the walkway. When we got back to the door to her room, she put the brakes on, and so we walked for a while longer. The brakes came back on again when we got back to her room the second time, but this time I couldn't give her a choice. I think she would have stayed outside all day if I'd had the time.

I will never forget the look on her face when she stepped out of her stuffy room and into the sunlight and fresh air. It made me wonder how long it had been since she'd been outside. Then I wondered if taking her outside made going back to her room harder for her to stay there now that she'd seen the light quite literally. Finally deciding not to over-think the situation, I realized that what we had just experienced was what I like to call a holy moment. The Holy Spirit was there. I felt His presence. God has been equipping me for this moment all my life. I grew up with people with disabilities, worked with people with disabilities professionally, and raised a son, now 27, with a developmental disability. In this setting, I was empowered to simply minister to this very young woman – something that is more difficult to do due to privacy issues in my own country. And, I was encouraged after the fact when my friend, Julie, had a bit of a "duh" moment. "It never occurred to me that you would relate so well to her before you came, and now it is so obvious!"

We adopted Nadiyah in our hearts while in Jordan. We pray for her every day. And now as a result of rethinking Christmas, we've decided to include her in our lives more tangibly, even though we will probably never see her again. We will still give

our adult children and their spouses Christmas presents, though more personal and less expensive than in years past. But the money we would have typically spent on them will now be sent to Samaritan's Purse for Nadiyah's support – specifically things that will enhance the quality of her life.

So from now on, if anyone asks how many kids we have, the answer will be six. Kristy, Tracy, Jeff, David, John, and Nadiyah.

From Pastor Steve

RLC in Mission for Christ: People not Programs

Think for a moment which you remember most, the people who have impacted your Christian life or the programs that have impacted you. As I reflect on this question I always remember the people and rarely remember programs. Pastor Jim Loken came to my home church, Resurrection Lutheran in Redondo Beach (my first RLC), when I was my son Zeke's age, 12. PJ was young, energetic, loved Jesus and having grown up down the coast from us in San Diego he too loved to surf. I learned about relational ministry from him.

Pastor Jim, I called him PJ, innately understood the difference between people and programs in doing ministry. PJ practiced "relational ministry" way before it was popularized. Relational ministry focuses on relationships with others for the sake of making Christ's name known and advancing the kingdom of God. Relational ministry, though it may at times include programs, does not have its focus on them. Neither does the church that is in Mission for Christ. Relational ministry always focuses on people and so does the missional church.

A program-oriented church focuses on providing programs for the church consumer. An array of options and electives are offered for those in the congregation to pick and choose as they put together their Christian curriculum. The "church" becomes the institution of Christian learning and the "staff" becomes the dispensers of Christian knowledge. A good example of this is the traditional Confirmation program. When I went through Confirmation I was dropped off by my parents once a week on Wednesday nights at the church where the Pastor taught me Luther's Small Catechism as he lectured for an hour and a half. That was it. And very painful it was indeed!

A people-oriented church, a missional church, focuses on providing Godly relationships for all people, both within and without. Relationships, not the institutional impartation of knowledge or programs purposed to do this, come to the fore and all people are equipped, empowered, and encouraged to enter into relationships with others for the sake of making Christ's name known and advancing the kingdom of God. RLC's (my second RLC) current Confirmation ministry, (note the difference from program to ministry here), is a good example of how a people-oriented church works. Through a retreat and relational format, families are encouraged to work through Luther's Small Catechism together through pre and post retreat activities which foster dialogue between student and parents. The church then augments this by providing further teaching and modeling of Christian discipleship through retreats, mid-week and Sunday programs, and small groups. You'll notice programs are used here as a tool not the goal.

Making this shift from being program-oriented to being people-oriented, missional, will take some time as we learn to think and do things differently. However, making this change is necessary if we are to be in mission for Christ.

Congregation Council News and Views

To those 121 of you who were able to attend the Annual Congregation Meeting, **Thank You!** There was a lot of business to conduct and an exciting Ministry Plan to preview. Here are some highlights:

- We accepted the minutes of three previous meetings: October 31, 2010 annual meeting; November 2, 2010 special meeting to call Pastor Steve Ernst; June 26, 2011 special meeting to preliminarily approve the new constitution.
- We ratified the amended constitution, as preliminarily approved, and made it effective as of November 1, 2011.
- We heard an Overview of 2011 by Pastor Ernst; the Treasurer's Report by our Treasurer, Rich Olsen; and the 2011 Council Report by Dave Brandes, Congregational Vice President.

The high-light of the meeting was the briefing on the **Ministry Plan for 2012** by Pastor Ernst, Corey Smith, Debbie Stankovich, and Maria Frame – with the overall emphasis on focusing on the *Great Commission* and on thinking about our membership in RLC as being part of the body of the *Priesthood of All Believers*. You will be learning more about how you can engage in this plan in the months ahead.

To support the Ministry Plan of 2012, the Congregation:

- Approved an amended budget that includes a Ministry Budget of \$170,095, a Council Budget of \$540,776, and a Benevolence Budget of \$71,087. The budget is the same as published in the Ministry plan except for an increase in the budget to support the Christian Yoga program. This item was in the original version of the budget the Council accepted but had been omitted from the published version. The Christian Yoga program reaches 60 to 70 persons each week, half of whom are not RLC members. So, it is considered an outreach effort while it also encourages and supports healthy lifestyles. Accordingly, the benevolence budget was also increased as we budget 10% of the operating budget for benevolence.
- Elected by acclamation for the <u>Nominating Committee</u>: Jon Erlandson, Traci Moran, and Mark Underwood; for the <u>Call Committee</u>: Karen Clark, Sandi Edgemon, Mike Schwartz, Adele Sorensen, Bob Thompson, and Russ Warren; and for the <u>Congregation Council</u>: Mot Hedges, President; Dave Brandes, Vice President; Rob Barr, member at large; and Scott Hardman, member at large.

As I write this article -- a day after Reformation Day and it is not even Thanksgiving yet - I am looking ahead to the celebration of the birth of the Christ Child. For to us a child is born, to us a son is given, and the government will be on his shoulders. And he will be called Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace -- Isaiah 9:6 (NIV). Jesus is the reason for the season. Have a blessed Christmas!

Parish Health Ministry

Maintaining Your Optimal Health

One Step At A Time

We are experiencing difficult economic times and we often feel helpless in influencing our total economic future. We definitely feel the stress of the uncertainty of these times. One area where we can influence our lives, however, and help reduce stress is with maintaining our optimal health. In the coming months of 2012, you will find a little bit of information from professionals to assist you in maintaining your optimal physical, mental, and spiritual health, one step at a time.

Since influenza season is upon us, our first step is to remain as healthy as possible during this season. The following information I am sharing with you is from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). Visit their site for more information.

Preventing the Flu: Good Health Habits Can Help Stop Germs

The **single best way to prevent seasonal flu is to get** <u>vaccinated</u> each year, but good health habits like covering your cough and washing your hands often can help stop the spread of germs and prevent respiratory illnesses like the flu. There also are <u>flu antiviral drugs</u> that can be used to treat and prevent the flu.

- 1. Avoid close contact.
- Avoid close contact with people who are sick. When you are sick, keep your distance from others to protect them from getting sick too.
- 2. Stay home when you are sick.
- If possible, stay home from work, school, and errands when you are sick. You will help prevent others from catching your illness.
- 3. Cover your mouth and nose.
- Cover your mouth and nose with a tissue when coughing or sneezing. It may prevent those around you from getting sick.
- 4. Clean your hands.
- Washing your hands often will help protect you from germs. If soap and water are not available, use an alcohol-based hand rub.
- 5. Avoid touching your eyes, nose or mouth.
- Germs are often spread when a person touches something that is contaminated with germs and then touches his or her eyes, nose, or mouth.
- 6. Practice other good health habits.
- Get plenty of sleep, be physically active, manage your stress, drink plenty of fluids, and eat nutritious food.

People at High Risk of Developing Flu-Related Complications

Most people who get the flu will have mild illness, will not need medical care or antiviral drugs, and will recover in less than two weeks. Some people, however, are more likely to get flu complications that result in being

hospitalized and occasionally result in death. Pneumonia, bronchitis, sinus infections and ear infections are examples of flu-related complications. The flu also can make chronic health problems worse. For example, people with asthma may experience asthma attacks while they have the flu, and people with chronic congestive heart failure may have worsening of this condition that is triggered by the flu. The list below includes the groups of people more likely to get flu-related complications if they get sick from influenza.

- Children younger than 5, but especially children younger than 2 years old
- Adults 65 years of age and older
- Pregnant women
- Also, American Indians and Alaskan Natives seem to be at higher risk of flu complications
- People who have medical conditions including:
 - Asthma
 - Neurological and neurodevelopmental conditions [including disorders of the brain, spinal cord, peripheral nerve, and muscle such as cerebral palsy, epilepsy (seizure disorders), stroke, intellectual disability (mental retardation), moderate to severe developmental delay, muscular dystrophy, or spinal cord injury].
 - Chronic lung disease (such as chronic obstructive pulmonary disease [COPD] and cystic fibrosis)
 - Heart disease (such as congenital heart disease, congestive heart failure and coronary artery disease)
 - Blood disorders (such as sickle cell disease)
 - Endocrine disorders (such as diabetes mellitus)
 - Kidney disorders
 - Liver disorders
 - Metabolic disorders (such as inherited metabolic disorders and mitochondrial disorders)
 - Weakened immune system due to disease or medication (such as people with <u>HIV or</u> AIDS, or cancer, or those on chronic steroids)
 - People younger than 19 years of age who are receiving long-term aspirin therapy
 - People who are morbidly obese (Body Mass Index, or BMI, of 40 or greater)


