A New Year's Covenant

Some people are able to follow through on those promises, but most fail within weeks. Experts now suggest people adopt a theme instead of a goal for the year if they genuinely want to change. The idea is to focus on the intention instead of a rigid, self-imposed rule. In a sense, that is what Richland Lutheran Church has done for the coming year.

The 2012 Ministry Plan is guided by a simply-stated vision.

Our Vision – Richland Lutheran Church is a congregation of Christ followers who are making Jesus Christ known to all people and advancing His Kingdom.

The vision is implemented by a clear mission statement,

Our Mission – Richland Lutheran Church fulfills its vision and calling by entering and engaging the world as God himself did through the person and work of Jesus Christ.

What if every member of Richland Lutheran Church made decisions about spending time, talent, and treasure on the *impact* of that investment?

Imagine the impact Richland Lutheran Church could have in the world if every member asked one simple question before making any decisions: "How will involvement (or noninvolvement) in this activity make Jesus Christ known and advance His Kingdom?"

In a world contaminated by clutter and competition for our attention, it is easy to lose focus. That reality makes intentionality in all we do even more important. This congregation will be asking the question above as it works through the 2012 Ministry Plan. But just asking the question is not enough without the resolve to do things differently.

Let us begin by thinking differently. We have already begun to rethink Christmas. Now, let's rethink resolutions. Make a New Year's covenant this year. A covenant, in the biblical sense, implies much more than a contract or simple agreement. It is a permanent arrangement involving a person's total being and the most poignant example is in Jesus Christ:

"This cup is the new covenant in my blood; do this, whenever you drink it, in remembrance of me."

God's vision was that His people would be reconciled with Him. The mission of Jesus was to fulfill that vision. With unwavering resolve, He embodied a new covenant. How can we do anything less?

RLC in Mission for Christ: It is Better to Give Than Receive

Can you believe we're already into a new year? Where did 2011 go? With a new year RLC begins a new adventure guided by our ministry plan, as outlined in the cover article. Truth be told, it's already starting to happen. We've just come out of the Advent season where together we committed to "Rethink Christmas," giving more to our Lord by worshipping fully, giving more to those we love by spending less and giving more, giving more to all people by loving all. For many of us the old adage, "It is better to give than receive," has deeper and more profound meaning than ever before.

What a great mindset to catapult us into the new year as we seek to fulfill our vision to "Make Jesus Christ known and advance His kingdom." A necessary mindset if we are to fulfill our mission to "Enter and engage the world." For without a "better to give than receive" mindset and an "others first" heart we won't enter and engage the world. Rather, we'd play it safe, remain comfortable within our own walls, and focus on receiving rather than giving.

Unfortunately this is where the Christian Church in America has come and in many ways remains today, especially mainline churches (typically considered to be the American Baptist Churches in the USA; the Episcopal Church; the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America; the Presbyterian Church (USA); the United Church of Christ; and the United Methodist Church). Whether deliberately or not the "Better to receive than give" mentality has permeated the church and, among other factors, leads us to decline. The Barna Research Group in a 2009 article reports, "In the past fifty years, mainline church membership dropped by more than one-quarter." That is a staggering and sobering statistic. Author Scot McKnight writes, "Because the Western Church has become hesitant to declare the Good News about Jesus, it needs to be called back to the task of reaching out to others. The Anglican leader and evangelist Michael Green cuts through church cant: 'God's church exists not for itself but for the benefit of those who are not yet members...[and] the church which lives for itself will be sure to die by itself.' The church is not a religious club and it does not have a secular mission. Instead, it is a worshipping and sending community."

If we, as a mainline church, want to survive we must do something different than we've done in the last fifty years. Entering and engaging the world is a good place to start. By entering and engaging the world to make Jesus Christ known and advance His kingdom we break the cycle of hesitancy to declare the Good News about Jesus and begin to reach out to others. This won't be easy but making this change is necessary if we are to be in mission for Christ.

Make Jesus Christ known and advance His kingdom.

Parish Health Ministry

Maintaining Your Optimal Health

One Step At A Time

I grew up in Wisconsin on a "truck" farm a short distance from the city of Milwaukee. While we didn't grow trucks, we grew healthy vegetables such as cabbage, cucumbers, cauliflower, peppers and onions. My Father was of German descent and although he was anything but sophisticated, he was a wise man. He always told us kids that if you had your health you had everything. Although not everyone has inherited good health, everyone has the opportunity to influence their health in a number of ways. As a church member, I attend weekly services to feed my spiritual soul, as a human being, I need to feed my body properly to maintain my physical health.

Last month we talked about influenza and the importance of being immunized and staying healthy during this season. As 2012 begins, we are reminded to watch what we eat to optimize our health. Although my Father probably didn't realize it, his life's calling and vocation of supplying vegetables to the Milwaukee area helped in this.

Over the years, the USDA has changed their dietary recommendations. Today, they recommend the following, as indicated by their website. You will notice that fruits and vegetables are recommended to make up ½ of your daily consumption, the use of whole grains for ½ of your grain intake, consumption of low fat protein, and use of low fat dairy products round out our healthy daily meal plate. Dietary Guidelines:

Balancing Calories:

- Enjoy your food, but eat less
- Avoid oversize portions

Foods to Increase:

- Make at least half your plate fruits and vegetables.
- Make at least half your grains whole grains.
- Switch to fat free or low fat (1%) milk.

Foods to reduce:

- Compare sodium in foods like soups, breads, and frozen meals.
- Drink water instead of sugary drinks.

Called to the Union Gospel Mission

About two years ago I started going to the Union Gospel Mission on the 4th Sunday of the month with other RLC members to help provide worship service for the people who gathered there for food and shelter.

As I reflect back to when I first joined this group, I felt God calling me but it took me several months before I actually responded to His call. I felt anxiety. This would be something new for me; completely outside of my comfort zone. The Mission? These are jobless and homeless people. The kind of people I'm not use to being around. What do I do? What do I say? How do I act? There was definitely a misguided perception that I needed to let go of. After all, as the old saying goes – "But for the grace of God there go I." So I finally ventured out (with a few of my Growth Group buddies), and took the leap. Was I nervous? Oh...Yes! I didn't know what to expect. And I certainly didn't want to have to get up in front of everyone to speak. That was really my biggest fear. I went along thinking I would just sit and observe. But, as it turned out, I jumped in with all fours and actively participated. The men (and, at that time, women) were great, as was the rest of the group from RLC.

Fast forward a couple of years, and here I am. Still going to the Mission and helping to share God's word – not only with the men who gather to hear us, but with each other as well. God is amazing and sends us to amazing places and people in our lives. The format is a bit different now – we share what's on our hearts and not just what's on a piece of paper that has been handed to us to read. Many of the men sit and listen; others simply take this time to nap. But that's okay too. Our readings are often interspersed with an "Amen" from the audience or even an occasional applause. If even one has heard and feels the presence of Jesus making a change in his life, then we have done what God asks of us.

I feel rewarded to be able to share God's word with these men and show them that, not only does God care, but we do as well. We reach out to them one Sunday evening every month with God's word but, unbeknownst to them, they are reaching out to each of us as well. I can't even begin to explain the feeling that comes over me as we file out at the end of the worship service and are greeted with a handshake, a "Thank You" or even a "God Bless You". And, as we return as a group to RLC's parking lot we often talk amongst ourselves sharing our observations with each other and what we experienced during that evening's worship service. It's amazing how God works and who He works through. I truly feel that, even though we are there to serve these men at the Mission, they are serving us in return. Thank you, God! You have truly blessed me.

Each year, graduating seniors and currently-enrolled college students of Richland Lutheran Church are encouraged to apply for financial support from the various sources offered.

The origin and intent of each fund is described here. Please take a few moments to consider how the funds might help you achieve your educational or career goals. Then, contact Corey Smith and he will supply you with the Application Cover Sheet and the required documents to apply for the support you desire. We sincerely hope we can be of help to you in achieving your goals.

Application deadline is February 19, 2012.

Mark Black Award - This honorary award was established in memory of Mark Black who was killed in the Vietnam War. Given at the same time as the scholarships and grants, it recognizes a graduating senior who has shown exceptional character through faithfulness in worship, leadership and Christian responsibility in the life of the congregation. Because the Pastoral Staff and Executive Council select the recipient of this award there is no application process. The amount of this award is \$1000.

Gary Lucke Memorial Scholarship - This fund was established by Nancy and Daryl Lucke in memory of their son, Gary, who was killed in an automobile accident while a student at WSU. Interested students must submit a letter to the Higher Education Committee indicating their interest in this scholarship. A five-hundred word essay containing information about the student's background, financial need, education, and career plan is required. The funds from this scholarship are available to confirmed Lutheran high school seniors of high moral standards with financial need to help offset the costs of higher education, as determined by the student. The scholarship is renewable annually. The amount available is \$500.

Grimsrud Lutheran Educational Scholarship - This scholarship honors the memory of Reverend Milton and Solvig Grimsrud. Milt was RLC's first pastor, returning as visitation pastor in his retirement years. The scholarship is given to a college student attending a Lutheran college or seminary. A supplemental application is available in the church office. The amount available is \$350 per semester with a maximum of \$700 per year.

Richland Lutheran Church Grant - This grant is not restricted to a Lutheran institution, and there are no minimum GPA requirements. Submit a letter indicating interest along with a three hundred word essay setting forth financial need, educational goals and career plans. The amount available is \$500.

Ruth Smith/Mary Jane O'Black Loan Fund - No interest loans of \$600, available to RLC members pursuing higher education. The application form is available in the church office. Include proposed timeframe for repaying the loan and two personal references, including current addresses and phone numbers.

Bruce Higley Scholarship - A scholarship fund was established by Kathy Higley in memory of her husband, Bruce, who had a lifelong passion for and career in science and engineering. The scholarship is \$1,000 a year for as long as the funds are available. Applicants must have achieved upper classman status, be enrolled as a full-time student at an accredited university, have and declared a science-related major. It is also available to graduate students pursuing science-related degrees. To apply for this grant, a letter indicating interest along with a three-hundred word essay setting forth educational goals and career plans must be submitted to the Minister of Christian Education. Recipients of this scholarship must be members of Richland Lutheran Church.

God: All Absent And Accounted For

Recently, someone reported to me a dear friend, going through the wringer of adversity, had been advised by that someone to pray about the situation. The response? "God doesn't seem to be listening!"

I grimaced with disappointment (judgment?) at hearing this, before reflecting upon recent sufferings qualifying me to join *The Rolling Stones*. It was bad enough at the onset; but the real pain set in *after* the operation and the insertion of temporary stents in each kidney. For a couple of weeks it meant several times a day - and night - that sound coming from behind the closed door of the throne room at our residence, was me in a loud falsetto crying out the most basic of prayers: "Oh No! Lord help me! Take the pain away!"

Confession: the above prayer on my part - or a reasonable facsimile - has always worked well for me in the dentist's chair (albeit, the silent version of that prayer. What good would it be to audible a prayer with a dentist's hand in your mouth - unless someone in the room had the gift of the interpretation of tongues?) It has worked so well, that I've often said that it wasn't the pain of what the dentist was doing that was so bad: it was the pain of paying for it!

Anyway, God didn't seem to be listening in the midst of my crying prayers either. But in the delirium of my pain and its anticipation: I discovered that God was indeed speaking to me, if only I was listening (think the complete texts of at least sixteen terrific articles and four boffo sermons came to me - too bad I can't remember them in their entirety, so you'll have to take my word for it.)

The principle learned is: God speaks most clearly at the point where we are aware of His absence. Those are the moments when we discover His strength is made manifest in our weakness, and His grace is sufficient for us. Paul discovered this when his thorn in the flesh got to him. Jesus experienced this at Gethsemane and on the cross. This latter expressed in those holy words "Eloi, Eloi, lama sabachthani?...My God, my God, why have You forsaken me?" There is the ultimate experience of the silence of the Lamb and sense of the absence of God.

If we are to be heard by the world, we need to demonstrate faith also includes the experience of God apparently absent and silent, as though not listening. Perhaps then the world will listen to us since it knows what life is like without the manifest reality of God. Advent season should have reminded us we'll miss any visitation of God's presence unless we're prepared for His seeming absence and silence. Listen for Him in those moments.


