

# "It's *Still* All About Jesus!"




Lent is the liturgical (an arrangement and/or form of worship services) season in the Church year set aside for fasting, abstinence, and penitence in preparation for Easter. Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, 40 days before Easter not counting Sundays (Sunday's are not included because in the Church liturgical year every Sunday

we celebrate the resurrection of Jesus. That is why the Christian Church worships on Sundays and not Saturdays, the Sabbath before the resurrection of Jesus).

This Lent at RLC we will be worshiping on Thursday nights, as is our practice, and sharing a soup supper together (this is part of our practice of abstinence, not sharing a whole meal). Corey Smith will be teaching about Jesus using some of the names used for Jesus [Son of God, Son of Man, Christ, Light of the World, Adonai (Lord), Lamb of God].

On Sunday mornings through Lent Pastor Steve will be teaching us about the Spiritual Disciplines of Prayer, Scripture Reading, Fasting, Meditation, and Worship. Practicing Spiritual Disciplines aids us in getting closer to God, discerning his will, hearing from him clearly, casting our cares upon him, living in peace and by the power of the Holy Spirit and much more. Since its inception, the Church has put much emphasis on practicing and living spiritual disciplines with special emphasis during the season of Lent.

We hope you will join us this Lent as we grow deeper in faith and obedience to our Lord and Savior, Jesus.

# From Pastor Steve



#### RLC in Mission for Christ: You Can't Give What You Don't Have

In Latin it's, "Nemo potest dare quod non habet," "you can't give what you don't have." As developed in the Church, this adage reminded the minister to maintain good spiritual habits and disciplines especially as it pertained to proclaiming God's Word. The premise was thus, one cannot communicate God's Word to others without knowing God's Word oneself. From this the study and meditation of and upon God's Word, both formal and informal, came to the fore for those charged with preaching and teaching it. And good thing it did! Can you imagine the kinds of things that would come from the pulpit if ministers of God's Word didn't know it? Unfortunately, you don't have to dig very deep to find such ministers.

Think for a moment about how this adage affects our, RLC's, vision and the implications thereof. If the saying, "you can't give what you don't have," is true in regard to proclaiming God's Word, then isn't it also true in proclaiming God himself and God's Kingdom? For that is our vision isn't it? All you need do is look on a bulletin cover and see, "RLC is a congregation of Christ followers who are making Jesus Christ known to all people and advancing His Kingdom." It follows then, we can't make Christ's name known without knowing Christ and we can't advance God's Kingdom without Kingdom living. We don't need a fancy Latin phrase to alert us to this truth, it just makes sense, doesn't it.

What does this mean? A good Lutheran question isn't it. It simply means we must know Christ ourselves before we make him known to others. To know Christ is to believe in him and live a life of faith following his lead. To know Christ is to worship him, to give our lives in surrender and submission, to serve in humble obedience. It also means we must live in God's Kingdom before we seek to advance it. Kingdom living means to live a life where God has rule and reign, a life filled with God's grace and promises, a life lived using healthy spiritual habits and disciplines like: prayer, scripture reading, silence, fasting, meditation, worship, etc.

We must be careful here not to "get the cart before the horse." We can't give what we don't have. So we must know Christ and live in God's Kingdom before we try to make Christ's name known and advance God's Kingdom. May we also seek to know Jesus and practice Kingdom living!

# Communication Changes

In an effort to be better stewards of all God has entrusted to us, some alterations to some of our publications will be made over the next month or so. Our goal is to make the church website the first place you go for information, and are working diligently to make it the resource you deserve and expect. We understand not everyone has access to or likes to use the internet, so we hope a gradual, phased-in approach will help us identify where the unintended consequences are as we try to be better stewards of all resources.

**Worship Bulletins:** We have begun posting the weekly announcements on the website and will eventually be eliminating them from the bulletins. There will still be a short stack of printed announcements when you come to worship for those of you who do not have electronic access. The "welcome" inside the front cover of the bulletin is being reformatted and will be put in the pew racks. Instead of printing the Biblical references every week, we will allow time for worshipers who wish to follow along to find the lessons in the pew Bibles provided. Since the number of pew Bibles is limited, we suggest bringing your own Bible – especially if you like to take notes as God speaks to you through His Word.

Newsletter: The distribution system for The Preview will be modified beginning with the April issue.

- If you are homebound, we will still send a hard copy of the newsletter to you.
- If you attend church regularly and still want a hard copy, we will place one in your mailbox.
- If your e-mail address is in our directory, you will be included in the *RLC Grapevine* e-mail list and be sent a link to the newsletter once it has been posted to the website.
- If you have already told us to not send you a hard copy of the newsletter because you get it off the website, nothing will change for you.
- The amount of paper, ink, postage, volunteers, staff time, and money it takes to provide these publications is astounding. If we can reduce waste by even 50%, the impact will be significant. # "Let us start rebuilding."

The church staff meets every Tuesday morning. Before we get into the business of the day we spend some time meditating on God's Word and in prayer. For several weeks now we have been studying Nehemiah. As I was thinking about this message to you, it occurred to me that there are some parallels between the people who rebuilt the wall of Jerusalem and the people of Richland Lutheran Church.

Nehemiah was cupbearer to King Artaxerxes of Persia. Upon learning that the walls of Jerusalem were broken down, Nehemiah asked the King for and received permission to return and rebuild them. He gathered the Jews, priests, nobles, officials, and others who would be doing the work.

"Then I said to them, 'You see the trouble we are in: Jerusalem lies in ruins, and its gates have been burned with fire. Come, let us rebuild the wall of Jerusalem, and we will no longer be in disgrace.' I also told them about the gracious hand of my God on me and what the king had said to me. They replied, 'Let us start rebuilding.' So they began this good work. Nehemiah 2:17-19


Under the leadership of Nehemiah, the walls were rebuilt in just 52 days. Yes, there were people who opposed the project, tried to undermine the effort, and said it could not be done. But Nehemiah and the people he led stayed focused on God and His will, and accomplished what God called them to do.

When I wrote to you last September about our financial challenges, it may have seemed that

overcoming a deficit of \$100,655 was impossible. But like the people in Nehemiah who rebuilt the wall, you, the members of Richland Lutheran Church have also started rebuilding. It now appears we will be ending 2011 with a deficit of \$44,893. That means the gap between offering and expenses was closed by \$55,762! It has been many years since RLC has ended the year with a deficit, so we were in the fortunate position of having a reserve fund to cover the expenses entirely. We will continue to identify ways in which we can reduce costs without compromising ministry as we use the 2012 year to rebuild reserves. I am also encouraged because the budget passed by the congregation is very realistic, only a 3.5% increase over actual giving in 2011.

I can almost hear you saying, "Let us start rebuilding," because I know you. The challenges before us are no more difficult for God than rebuilding the walls of Jerusalem. The gracious hand of our God is resting on all of us, just as it did for Nehemiah. It is my joy to serve our God with you. In a sense, it is as if we are working side-byside just as the people of Jerusalem did to rebuild this aspect of our ministry.

# From the Council

I would like to take this opportunity to talk to you about the Renovaré Essentials Conference at Richland Lutheran Church in April of next year. Renovaré is a Christian organization that assists Christians in becoming more like Christ through the spiritual practices of Jesus and the church. In the day-long conference we will worship, learn about the spiritual practices of Jesus and the Church, and practice these disciplines. The purpose of the conference is to motivate participants to make a commitment to participate in special small groups that emphasize practicing spiritual disciplines like prayer, fasting, and meditation on scripture.

A great example of these spiritual practices is given in a devotional book entitled "The Game with Minutes" by Frank Laubach. Laubach, in 1929, settled as a missionary among the fierce Moros, an Islamic tribe in the Philippines. There, he underwent a remarkable series of experiences of God, and simultaneously developed a technique for reducing the Moro language to writing. This not only made it possible to teach them to read in only a few hours, but permitted them immediately to teach others. Over the next forty years, Dr. Laubach visited 103 countries in an effort to bring literacy to the "silent billion."

In his book, Laubach urged Christians to attempt keeping God in mind for at least one second of every minute of the day. Laubach had found himself profoundly dissatisfied that he was not living his days "in minute by minute effort to follow the will of God." He then began trying to "line up" his actions with the will of God every few minutes. But in 1929 he began to try living all his waking moments "in conscious listening to the inner voice, asking without ceasing, 'What, Father, do you desire said? What, Father, do you desire done this minute?...'" In his view, this is exactly what Jesus did. Within weeks of beginning his experiments he began to notice differences. He gained a sense of being carried along by God through the hours, of cooperation with God in little things, which he had never felt before. "I need something, and turn around to find it waiting for me. I must work, ... but there is God working along with me."

"This concentration upon God is strenuous, but everything else has ceased to be so!" That was especially true of his relations to the Moros, who, seeing the difference in him, took him entirely into their hearts and lives, loving, trusting, and helping him without regard to their cultural and religious differences. Two of the leading Moslem priests went about the area telling their people that Laubach would help them to know God. He never pretended to be anything but a follower of Jesus, but he studied the Bible and the Koran with the priests and the people and prayed in their services with them.

If we were to experience this same constant presence of God in our lives think what a difference it would make as we live out our vision to engage the world as God himself did through the person and work of Jesus Christ.

# **RLC Scholarship Program**

Richland Lutheran Church has a proud tradition of supporting its members in pursuit of higher education.

Each year, graduating seniors and currently-enrolled college students of Richland Lutheran Church are encouraged to apply for financial support from the various sources offered.

The origin and intent of each fund is described here. Please take a few moments to consider how the funds might help you achieve your educational or career goals. Then, contact Corey Smith and he will supply you with the Application Cover Sheet and the required documents to apply for the support you desire. We sincerely hope we can be of help to you in achieving your goals.

Application deadline is February 26, 2012.

(Please note, this is a change.)

Mark Black Award - This honorary award was established in memory of Mark Black who was killed in the Vietnam War. Given at the same time as the scholarships and grants, it recognizes a graduating senior who has shown exceptional character through faithfulness in worship, leadership and Christian responsibility in the life of the congregation. Because the Pastoral Staff and Executive Council select the recipient of this award there is no application process. The amount of this award is \$1000.

Gary Lucke Memorial Scholarship - This fund was established by Nancy and Daryl Lucke in memory of their son, Gary, who was killed in an automobile accident while a student at WSU. Interested students must submit a letter to the Higher Education Committee indicating their interest in this scholarship. A five-hundred word essay containing information about the student's background, financial need, education, and career plan is required. The funds from this scholarship are available to confirmed Lutheran high school seniors of high moral standards with financial need to help offset the costs of higher education, as determined by the student. The scholarship is renewable annually. The amount available is \$500.

**Grimsrud Lutheran Educational Scholarship** - This scholarship honors the memory of Reverend Milton and Solvig Grimsrud. Milt was RLC's first pastor, returning as visitation pastor in his retirement years. The scholarship is given to a college student attending a Lutheran college or seminary. A supplemental application is available in the church office. The amount available is \$350 per semester with a maximum of \$700 per year.

**Richland Lutheran Church Grant** - This grant is not restricted to a Lutheran institution, and there are no minimum GPA requirements. Submit a letter indicating interest along with a three hundred word essay setting forth financial need, educational goals and career plans. The amount available is \$500.

**Ruth Smith/Mary Jane O'Black Loan Fund -** No interest loans of \$600, available to RLC members pursuing higher education. The application form is available in the church office. Include proposed timeframe for repaying the loan and two personal references, including current addresses and phone numbers.

**Bruce Higley Scholarship -** A scholarship fund was established by Kathy Higley in memory of her husband, Bruce, who had a lifelong passion for and career in science and engineering. The scholarship is \$1,000 a year for as long as the funds are available. Applicants must have achieved upper classman status, be enrolled as a full-time student at an accredited university, have and declared a science-related major. It is also available to graduate students pursuing science-related degrees. To apply for this grant, a letter indicating interest along with a threehundred word essay setting forth educational goals and career plans must be submitted to the Minister of Christian Education. Recipients of this scholarship must be members of Richland Lutheran Church.

# Parish Health Ministry

<u>Maintaining Your Optimal Health</u> <u>One Step at a Time</u> By Diane Bonin

One complaint I hear often from others is about sleep. My son complains he doesn't get enough sleep most nights, while my 93 year old mother-in-law states she gets too much. We have people experiencing insomnia by not being able to get asleep, not being able to stay asleep or waking early before enough sleep is obtained. One thing we can all agree on is that sleep is necessary for our overall physical, emotional and mental wellbeing; and lack of sleep affects our lack of concentration, memory, as well as relationships with others. Experts tell us that without sleep we cannot survive as it is essential for our health. Research tells us that infants need about 16 hours of sleep per day, teenagers about 9, and most adults 7-8 hours, although these numbers vary by individual.

The experts give us several tips to increase our chances of a good night's sleep. Here are the tips:

\*avoid caffeine and other stimulants before bed.

\* participate in calming activities in the hours immediately before bedtime-- vigorous exercise,

computer use or deciding to balance your checkbook are not recommended activities.

\*make sure your bed and bedroom environment is comfortable and quiet.

\* follow bedtime rituals to prepare your body for sleep.

\* make sure you are not hungry when turning in; a light snack such as a glass of milk may be beneficial in helping you sleep.

\*don't go to bed if you aren't tired. You should be able to fall asleep within 20 minutes.

\*retire and arise at approximately the same time each day, to keep a consistent routine.

I offer one more thought, one word--prayer. Conversing through prayer can assist in a number of ways. Placing one's cares in another's hands, calming of oneself, or praying in preparation before bed, can be helpful in getting that good night's sleep.

# Perpetual Change is Here to Stay!

I was going to entitle this article, *Leaving No Stone Unturned*, because when I went in for my ultrasound last week, the woman who administered it, asked me, "Have you been trying to pass that stone?" Well, the implication of that question - namely, that I already had developed a stone - was not something I rejoiced to hear. Fortunately, (or should I say, "Praise the Lord!") when I got to the urologist later that week, he and the radiologist said I had no recurrence (yet?). Anyway, that - plus the anticipated critical review I'd have received from the Mrs., namely: didn't I think I'd milked all the stone jokes enough(?) - title or subject is not necessary now. Instead, we'll engage a subject surrounding aging.

Announcing that subject, I've undoubtedly lost the younger set among the readership in what should be a topic of intense interest to all of us - young and old. After all, even my newborn grandson is aging. I was born old. My parents were well into their 40's when I came along; my only sibling is a sister ten years older than I am. I grew up in an older world, among parents, relatives - and their friends - who were part of Tom Brokaw's greatest generation. I frequently ministered and served among the elderly, and woke up one day to find out I was one! Elaine and I were starkly reminded of this in 2011 when both of us found ourselves at our respective 50th high school reunions.

Growing up old gave me to know the elderly regard change as their least favorite thing. Hence our title above. Christians might resort to "proof-texting" (not to be confused with modern texting) the Bible to express resistance to change. After all, in Malachi 3:6 God declares, "I the LORD do not change." But we forget Jesus' reminder in Matthew 22:32 that God has said of Himself, "I am the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob..." Note that these persons lived in different generations: grandparent, child, and grandchild. There was change during each of their respective lifetimes. We each are called to faithfulness in the prevailing features of our own generation and culture. Change is implied in God's personal covenant name "I AM" (Yahweh). This mysterious sacred name is variously translated as, "I AM WHO I AM", or "I AM BECAUSE I AM", or "I WILL BE WHO I WILL BE". The very name of God brings together the unchangeableness of His character and being, with His Presence in all the change He has set in motion.

The soul goes through seasons: new life and promise of fruit, loss and apparent deadness with assured hope of new life again. The secret is to appreciate the value of these changes/seasons and gain the benefits of each. The weathers of all seasons nourish souls. Don't fail to engage life. Don't drop out when it changes.


