

RLC in Mission for Christ: Membership

According to Merriam-Webster a member is "one of the individuals composing a group." Another definition given as it pertains to church specifically is "a person baptized or enrolled in a church." I don't know about you but these definitions leave me wanting more. Isn't being a member of a congregation much more than this? Shouldn't it be?

Unfortunately membership in churches often reflects these wanting definitions well. It is not uncommon to find those who think being a part of the group or enrolled is enough for church membership. This, "country club mentality" where you pay your dues and are entitled to club usage and benefits, prevails today in the Christian church. In fact, in direct correlation to this reality there has been a principle developed called the "20/80 Principle." This principle denotes the, all too often, reality that 20% of the membership in a congregation does 80% of the ministry. Even a cursory reading and limited understanding of Scripture would lead one to know this isn't the way it's supposed to be.

In the Church in Mission for Christ, membership might better be defined as partnership. Merriam-Webster defines partner as "one associated with another especially in an action." Here the association with one another is not simply to form a group or be enrolled together but focuses on "action," that is doing something. No doubt you have heard me quote Philippians 1 regularly as Paul addresses the church at Philippi thanking them for their "partnership" in the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Paul and the church shared in action in the Gospel, together doing the work of the ministry. This is the understanding and model of the New Testament Church.

You might also be surprised to know this is the understanding and model of Richland Lutheran Church as well, at least according to our governing documents. The RLC constitution says:

It shall be the privilege and duty of members of this congregation to: make regular use of means of grace, both Word and sacraments; live a Christian life in accordance with the Word of God and the teachings of the Lutheran church; support the work of this congregation through contributions of their time, abilities and financial support as biblical stewards. (C7.03)

Surprised? Clearly membership is not simply becoming part of the group. It is much more than this to include using the means of God's grace, living a Christian life, and supporting the work of this congregation through biblical stewardship. So, how are you doing? Are you living up to your commitments as a member? Are you involved in the work of this ministry? I encourage you, having been reminded of your membership commitments and as we continue to be in Mission for Christ, to hold these rights and responsibilities before you. Take them to heart, pray and consider where God might be leading you. And be the member God wants you to be!

Treasurer's Report

As reflected in the financial summary below, the financial results have been consistently strong in the first four months of 2012. Our offerings are up \$31,860, or 12.8% higher than the same time last year. Our expenses are down (\$24,134), or 9.4% less than the same time last year. Year to date, our offerings exceed expenses by \$48,677 compared to (\$7,318) in 2011. These results are reflected in the columns titled "Prior Year Comparison"

Year to Date actual offerings exceed expenses by \$48,677, and \$35,069 compared to the Year to Date budget.

From the Council

Worshipping God is more than just attending worship service once a week. It's an ongoing process and there are many ways in which we actively worship our Heavenly Father. I would like to take this opportunity to briefly explore two of those other forms of worship - volunteering and Christian education.

First, **volunteering** – Yes, this topic was addressed in last month's Preview by one of my fellow Council members. But, since I had already written my article and because I consider this to be such a critical and important part of God's ministry, I felt it worthwhile to speak to once again. So, please, bear with me.

During our Council meetings we frequently talk about the important role of volunteers within the church. Without the help of those individuals who now give so freely of their time and talents in their service to God, RLC would not thrive. And, on behalf of both Staff and Council, I thank you. You are "blessed to be a blessing".

I know all too well how difficult it is to give up more time, of which so many of us have so little. Today's society has created very busy lives for us, making it difficult to find that little bit of extra time to give for others. As Paul said in Philippians 2:4 (NIV), *"Each of you should look not only to your own interests, but also to the interests of others."* God has spoken. He knows how precious time is to us. But He wants us to take some of that "precious" time he has given us and share our God-given talents in service to Him by helping others – including His church. The act of volunteering is a means in which we can worship and glorify God and is a vital contributor to the well being of God's church. If you are looking for a way to exercise your spiritual gifts and talents for the glory of God, I invite you to consider one of the several opportunities that RLC has available. Your services are needed to help keep God's church strong and healthy and focused on our mission – and to help keep your fellow volunteers from "burn out". Is there an area where you can share your God-given gift of servitude? Do you hear God's voice calling you to give some of your time to His church? Will you answer His call?

Now, a bit about <u>**Christian education**</u> - Scripture tells us in James 4:8a (NIV), "Come near to God and he will come near to you." One way to "come near" to God is to increase our knowledge and understanding of Him and of His ways.

I was recently blessed with the opportunity to be one of twelve participants in RLC's very first Trinity Living Program. I confess that I almost missed God's invitation to this program by setting the letter aside with no response. Some may call this by another name – avoidance. "Ignore it and maybe it'll go away". But a very few days later I received a phone call that has now placed me on a new and exciting path. I felt God's nudge on the other end of that call and I am so grateful to the Holy Spirit for using this person (now my peer coach) to open my ears to hear and move my heart to answer His invitation. This program has been very rewarding to me both personally and spiritually. I don't know where God is taking me, but I do know that He is preparing me for something new and exciting – whatever and wherever that "new" is.

Christian education helps to deepen our spiritual growth in our walk with Christ, giving us a stronger and more meaningful Christian life – drawing us near to God so that He will draw near to us. The insights often

gained from Christian education can lead to a fuller, richer faith journey and more active involvement in the ministry of the church. Is God calling you to better love and serve Him through participation in such a program or a group, class or activity that is now or will be offered by RLC? Or, maybe He's calling you to start such a group? Will you answer His call by taking this journey with Him?

Active and Passive

Our century will see caregiving by and to the elderly as the single most important human resource issue in the church and the workplace according to respected and qualified sociologists. The good news is that in the midst of the aging of America, statistical studies show that the richest productivity occurs in the decade between the sixtieth and seventieth birthdays.

One study examined some four hundred names of the most notable persons in all times - statesmen, soldiers, poets, authors, artists, etc. Opposite each name was placed what was considered to be that person's greatest achievement. The list was then submitted to competent critics to make certain that they had chosen what was considered their most notable achievement. The result? 35% belonged between the ages of sixty and seventy; 23% between the ages of seventy and eighty; and 6% over the age of eighty. In other words, 64% of the greatest achievements belonged to those over sixty years of age!

The immediate objection to this study will be along the lines of: "Didn't Alexander the Great conquer the world when he was only thirty-three? Didn't Beethoven compose the Ninth Symphony when he was very young? How about Handel who produced "The Messiah' at a youthful age?" All of that is true. But you should note that all of these persons and accomplishments were *included* in the statistics in the above paragraph! In other words, they are the *exceptions* which prove the rule!

This means that the elderly - or as we like to refer to ourselves: mature - have a great deal to offer in this arena of the most important human resource issue of our century. Most communities are not equipped or prepared/preparing to meet this growing need. So-called "communities of faith" (another sign of the times, this catch-word for "churches") are in an excellent position to help American families plan and care for their older members. Studies show that Americans are more likely to rely on their own faith and advice from their clergy to address family problems than they are to rely on social service and other community agencies - and especially is this true among so-called "underserved groups." The capstone of all of this is that there is a statistical association between faith, religious attendance and good health - particularly in one's latter years.

The infirm elderly - forced into greater passivity - are a growing phenomenon in our world. The still active elderly have the greatest capacity to minister to this need. One of my many life verses is (since he is my namesake) "For when David had served God's purpose *in his own generation* (emphasis mine), he fell asleep..." (Acts 13:36). The "asleep" in that verse doesn't mean "nap" (although that sounds like a good idea). The active elderly ought to serve this purpose of God in our own generation. Opportunity knocks. Indeed, it abounds!

What in the world is the Walk With Christ?

You may or may not have heard some folks at RLC talk about The Walk with Christ. The Walk with Christ is a ministry here in Eastern Washington akin to ministries like Via de Cristo, DeColores, Lutheran Cursillo, and Walk to Emmaus. All are three-day retreats led by laypeople aimed at helping others grow in their relationship with Christ. Founded in Spain in 1944 by the Roman Catholic Church the retreats help Christian laypeople to become effective leaders over the course of a three-day weekend. The weekend includes talks, mostly given by laypeople. The major emphasis of the weekend is to ask participants to take what they have learned back into the world, on what they call the "fourth day". In 1957 it found its way to the United States and in the sixties the protestant church developed it for their folks. Today there are many expressions of this spiritual retreat and many who benefit by its ministry.

Our local Walk with Christ says about their goal, "The hope for The Walk with Christ weekend is that it will stimulate church members in new commitment to Christ. The weekend is intended to express the love of Christ in such a way that those who attend wish to pass on that love having been refreshed in their relationship with God in Christ. The imagery of walking the road to Emmaus is used to deepen and rekindle their relationship with Jesus, bringing new grace and compassion to their lives."

One of the great things is these retreats have also been developed specifically for young people. The Journey with Christ is the "youth" expression of this ministry and many of our youth have participated in such retreats. They have been a great tool to help our young people grow in faith and service to Christ.

In the 90's Ginnette and I attended the Lutheran Cursillo of Southern California experiencing these retreats. We found them to be a great way to kick-off for the first time or again a living passion for Jesus. This fall and next winter I plan to attend retreats as a worker giving my service to the broader Christian community and fostering the kingdom of God. If you get the opportunity to attend a retreat I highly recommend going. If you have interest please don't hesitate to contact me. I'd welcome the opportunity to discuss this great ministry with you further.

RLC will be the host facility for a girls' Journey later this month - June 21-24. As their hosts, we want to help the Journey staff provide a meaningful experience for the girls who are here to grow

their relationship with our Lord. In order to do this, we have promised them the private use of most of the building during those few days. Due to the nature of the sessions, and special worship services they will provide for the girls who are attending this Journey, some rooms will be closed at various times during each day. Please be aware of this and respectful of closed doors or areas during this short time they are here. If you have any questions, please feel free to call the church office.

Parish Health Ministry

<u>Maintaining Your Optimal Health</u> <u>One Step at a Time</u>



Spring is here and summer not very far behind. The weather is turning warm and our dress is getting lighter and we are exposing more skin to the elements than we did a few months ago. I heard a few days ago, that people, especially young people, are ignoring warnings to protect their skin from harmful rays that may lead to melanoma and other skin cancer diseases. Melanoma is the most common form of cancer in young adults 25-29 years of age, and is on the rise.

Melanoma is the skin cancer which happens to be the most dangerous. The American Cancer Society estimates that 120,000 new cases are diagnosed in the United States each year, in which over 68,000 (year 2010) of these cases were invasive melanomas. Melanoma kills an estimated 8,790 people in the US annually, but if diagnosed and treated early (before tumor penetrating the skin) is about 99%. It accounts for 5% of the skin cancers, but 75% of skin cancer deaths.

Everyone is a risk to develop melanoma, but the following factors increase your risk.

- **Sun Exposure**-Ultraviolet rays are dangerous to your skin and can cause melanoma. People, who reside in areas such as ours which have more sunlight have higher risks. An accumulation of sunlight over the years is dangerous as well as blistering sunburns.
- **Moles**-Atypical moles also known as dysplastic nevi, may be precursors to melanoma. The more moles you have, the higher the risk. Watch for asymmetrical moles on your skin.
- **Skin Type**-People with fairer skin are at higher risk for melanoma. **Personal History**-Once you develop melanoma, your risk chance increases for a reoccurrence. People who have had other types of skin cancer have a higher risk as well.
- Weakened Immune System- Compromised immune systems will increase your risk.
- **Family History**-If others within your family have had melanoma, you are at a higher risk level.

Protect yourself from the sun's harmful rays by:

- **Covering up** potential exposed skin areas with clothing, a wide brim hat and UV-ray protection sunglasses.
- **Use a broad spectrum sunscreen**. SPF 15 is recommended for everyday use, SPF 30+ waterproof sunscreen for extended outdoor activity use. Re-apply every two hours and after swimming or excessive sweating.
- Seek the shade, especially from 10 AM-4 PM
- Avoid tanning beds/booths.
- **Keep newborns out of the sun**. Sunscreen is not recommended until a child is over 6 months old.
- Don't allow your skin to burn.

- **Examine your skin head to toe monthly.** Examine yourself for any new or changing lesions that might be cancerous or precancerous. Check for skin growths that increase in size, and appear pearly, translucent, tan, brown, black or multicolored. Look for moles, birthmarks, or other marks and spots the change color, increase in size/thickness, are irregular in outline, larger than ¼", or appear after age 21. Note spots that itch, hurt, crust, scab, erode or bleed. Open sores should heal within three weeks. Seek medical assistance if you have any of these.
- See your physician or dermatologist for a professional skin exam.

No one wants to stay inside and not enjoy this great weather. Just remember to do it safely, heeding the dangers of the sun and taking the necessary precautions to be safe.

The main focus is to spend time with the community members and share the love of Jesus. It is a rewarding week, and even though we are there to serve and bless the Crow community, we always come back feeling quite blessed ourselves.

Please, won't you keep our group in prayer as we travel to Montana and serve in Lodge Grass? We will be leaving on June 16 and returning on June 22.


