Thank you for your prayer support during our trip. The experience was very meaningful for each of us who went to serve in Lodge Grass. God's presence was felt in so many ways through the Bible studies, the laughter and the tears, and the joy of spending time with the community. We worked hard, played hard, and enjoyed the company of others who also love and serve our God.

During the time spent in Lodge Grass, we were involved in work projects and implementing Kids Club for the children in the community. Some of our group scraped and painted a house, while others worked at the local school - cleaning, pulling up carpets, etc. Kids Club is run much like VBS and the children are there for two hours each afternoon. The children heard the story of Noah through skits, worked on a memory verse, sang songs, played games, read books, and made craft projects. New this year was OSC, or Outstanding Sports Camp. The Sports Camp was for older kids ages 10-14, and also included the weekly Bible story and memory verse. Part of our group was involved in starting that program for the whole week. We also visited with residents at the care facility in Crow Agency.

Our group was given opportunities to learn more about the Crow culture while in Lodge Grass. We spent time at the Little Bighorn Battlefield and an evening at the home of Wales Bulltail. He taught us the history of sweat lodge use, and about arrow throwing tournaments. We were even got to try throwing arrows! Before leaving on Friday, we went to the Native Days parade in Crow Agency, where we saw many of the Crow people dressed in festive native clothing as they celebrated their heritage.

RLC in Mission for Christ: Unity

The Apostle Paul writing to the Church in Ephesus says, "There is **one body** and **one Spirit**, just as you were called to **one hope** when you were called; **one Lord**, **one faith**, **one baptism**; **one God and Father of all**, who is over all and through all and in all" (emphasis mine). Here Paul emphasizes, very emphatically in fact using "one" seven times, the Church is united in many things.

We, the catholic or universal Church, share one body meaning the Church needs every expression of itself to function in a proper and healthy way (see 1 Cor. 12 and 14). We share the triune God, Father, Son, Spirit. We share one hope and faith in Christ Jesus. We even share in one baptism in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Not only are there many things the Church shares but they are the most important things.

The church in mission for Christ shares their "oneness" with the broader body and kingdom of God. It is able to put aside petty differences and even disagreements to work together to bring glory and honor to God. RLC is already well on its way in this endeavor. This past weekend we opened up our facility to Journey with Christ, an organization purposed to help young people encounter God in a deep and meaningful way through a weekend retreat. What a blessing it was to have them here and to support them through prayer and encouragement throughout the weekend.

Last spring we partnered with Shalom Church to bring tutoring to kids at Jefferson Elementary. Sure there are some clear differences in our theology and practice but for the sake of kids in our community and to proclaim the name of Jesus with our actions we put aside our differences and thank God for our unity in Him.

ShareFest is another great example of working together with the body of Christ to make an impact for Jesus in our community. In the past seven years here in the Tri-Cities, Churches (the body of Christ) involved with ShareFest have completed 1,162 projects, utilized 17,220 volunteers, donated 1,145 units of blood, 16 tons of food, \$303,000, and saved an estimated \$2 million to Tri-City community in wages and compensation.

These are just a few of the examples of the spirit of Ephesians 5:4-6 above being fulfilled here in the Tri-Cities. And, I am proud to say RLC is helping to lead the way to unity as a congregation in mission for Christ!

Financial Update

Treasurer's Report - May 2012

As reflected in the financial summary below, the financial results have been above plan for the first five months of 2012. Our offerings are up \$22,715, or 7.2% higher than the same time last year. Our expenses are down \$(26,475), or 8.2% less than the same time last year. Year to date, our offerings exceed expenses by \$40,415 compared to (\$8,775) in 2011. These results are reflected in the columns titled "Prior Year Comparison"

For the current month (May), actual offerings were under budget by \$(8,579) and actual expenses exceeded the budget by \$1,329. Year to Date, actuals for offerings exceed budget by \$13,701 and actual expenses are under budget by (\$11,459). For the current month, actual expenses exceed offerings by \$(8,261), and \$(9,908) compared to the budget. Year to Date actual offerings exceed expenses by \$40,415, and \$25,160 compared to the Year to Date budget.

From the Council

We have all heard the old adages, "Things change", "Life is change" and "Change will do you good." Just as change affects our personal lives, it also affects our church lives.

In this vein, for the past few months the Richland Lutheran Church (RLC) Council has been busy reviewing and proposing changes to the church constitution and by-laws to make them congruent with our current affiliation with the LCMC and the legal issues of our time. There have been many things to consider during these reviews and the Council is proposing important changes that will be presented to the congregation in the coming months.

The Council is planning to package the proposed changes and communicate them to the congregation during several HeBrews Café sessions this summer. These sessions will be your opportunity to learn first hand what changes are being proposed and to dialogue the proposed changes with the council members on the nature and reasons for the proposed changes.

The proposed changes to the constitution and by-laws will be presented for congregational vote during the October 2012 Annual Meeting. The constitutional changes that are initially approved during the October meeting will require a second vote which will take place during a special congregational meeting currently scheduled in January 2013. If ratified, the by-law changes will go into effect immediately following the October 2012 meeting.

Please watch for the upcoming dates and attend both the Council sponsored HeBrews Café sessions and the upcoming October and January votes.

An Anomalous Article

This month's Visitation column is an anomalous article, because it really isn't an article at all: in fact, it comes more in the form of an announcement - actually two announcements in one.

After over thirty-nine years as a licensed and ordained minister - plus another few decades as a Christian and dedicated church-attender - I can with authority proclaim to you that church announcements are an anomaly in themselves. We supposedly gather for worship of God; and yet, we, as a matter of necessary practicality, must also have various and sundry announcements in order to function. At least I *think* we do. I don't seem to find Jesus giving any announcements per se. Although, we do find Him making numerous pronouncements (i.e., "repent") and several very pointed announcements of the arrival of the kingdom, etc. But surely no announcements such as we have come to expect in the modern church sense (birthdays, anniversaries, deaths, illnesses, programs, functions, etc.)

Those type of announcements have been an anomaly to the modern clock-controlled church in its worship gatherings. Do you put them first, to get them out of the way in order to proceed to the hoped-for *real* reason we've supposedly gathered? Well, then the latecomers miss out on them. Do you put them in the middle of the service? That interrupts the train of worship. Do you do them at the end of the service? That only adds to the undoing of what the Holy Spirit has been doing in our time having met with God. Do you make *no* verbal announcements and trust the sheep to read all of them and respond appropriately? Well, then you're sure to offend someone and their particular ministry's interest by overlooking the emphasizing of it. And make no mistake, some announcements *should* be emphasized or momentarily given higher priority attention due to actual importance in the grander scheme of things, or because of deadlines, etc.

The church on earth will - and should - continue to struggle with the anomaly of what to do about its announcements; because if it doesn't, the sneaky tendency is that the announcements will overwhelm its worship. But as to their placement? Thankfully, there is no right or wrong place to put them in the context of the prescribed order of worship. Just so, *my* Visitation announcement(s) are to follow.

The Chaplaincy in the Tri-Cities will, this fall, be offering Spiritual Caregiving training over a ten-week period. Upon completion, this will tie in with local church ministries and/or opportunities in the community. We're hoping/recommending that there might be between three to five persons who would be interested in applying. A more detailed announcement of this will appear in your bulletins and/or during church announcement time. Second, those who've recently responded with interest in any way to our Visitation Team ministry opportunities will be receiving a letter from me in early July outlining some steps forward.

Maintaining Your Optimal Health

One Step at a Time

Maintaining good health isn't always easy and in life things go wrong. Accidents happen, diseases occur and surgeries are needed. Along with these, come the possibilities of the need for a blood transfusion. Although I have never needed a transfusion myself or known anyone needing a transfusion, I understand the importance of donating blood to help supply the blood bank so when needed it is available for the individual in need.

Donating blood is a great gift. Since not everyone can give, it is even more important for those of us able to give, to do so. Basic eligibility requirements include:

- ✓ Being in general good health (Some medical conditions and medications will make you ineligible to donate)
- ✓ Weigh at least 110 pounds
- ✓ Meet the minimum age requirement-16 years of age (parental consent required for youth)
- ✓ Have waited the minimum time between donations
- ✓ Provide an acceptable form of identification

The donation process is fairly simple:

- 1. Registration—registration includes identification with ID and reading of information about the donation process.
- 2. Health History---vital signs such as blood pressure is checked and blood iron levels obtained; and health questionnaire completed.
- 3. Donation---Red Cross staff clean an area on donor arm, insert a needle and draw blood. The blood draw takes approximately 5-7 minutes for a pint of blood, and arm is bandaged.
- 4. Refreshments—donor can relax with juice and snacks.

In preparation for the giving blood, the donor should eat a small, healthy, low-fat meal prior to donation, and eat iron rich foods to maintain a good iron level. Plenty of juice or water should be drunk throughout the day. Wear a short sleeved shirt or one that can easily be raised above the elbow. Avoid heavy lifting or exercise after the donation.



Middle School!


Grades 6-8


