Long Range Plan Update

It's easy in the church today, when thinking about the future and putting together a plan, to focus on things <u>we control</u> such as facilities, programs, staffing, finances and the like. When these become our foci we come up with a plan for our church and then invite God into *our* plan. This may be why many churches don't find the long range planning process and implementation thereof helpful. Though facilities, programs, staff, and finances are important, they are not what ought to drive the planning process. Instead, in church planning, we ought to focus on what <u>God controls</u> and considers most important, namely spiritual growth, and ask, "God, what is *your* plan for us and can we join you in it?" With great intentionality our long range planning team has focused on spiritual growth and discerning what God is doing among us.

Having worked together since last September the long range planning team is well on its way. Most recently we have put together and are now implementing our second survey trying to assess our strengths and weaknesses. Please take the ten minutes needed to take the survey at:

We've also received our results from the Reveal Spiritual Growth Survey and spent two days with leaders from our congregation (about 30) analyzing the results and working with a consultant to put together a plan to help us grow spiritually. We're also in the process of putting together material for focus groups to meet at the end of May and the beginning of June. Please be on the lookout for your opportunity to give even more input to the team.

The team is planning to have our work completed and a report prepared by August this year and to deliver a report to the congregation at a special meeting at that time. This will enable RLC to include the initial implementation of the long range plan in the 2014 ministry plan.

RLC in Mission for Christ: Do the Right Things

I'm sitting in the LCMC Leadership Conference in Birmingham, AL as I write this article. The speaker, Dr. Kent Hunter of Church Doctor Ministries, just said, "In our churches today we do a lot of things right, the question remains, do we do the right things?" So true! Thinking back on the churches I've been involved with over the years I can think of many things we've done right. Potlucks, check. Meetings, check. Felt board check. But are these, or other things we've done in our congregations the right things? Just because we do something right or well doesn't mean we ought to be doing it.

This reminds me of the time I tore the PCL in my right knee. When leaving my MRI appointment the radiologist, himself, stopped me and asked if I had a couple of minutes. Since this never happens I was immediately intrigued. Sitting at his desk with three large LCD screens in front of us he began to show and explain how badly I tore my PCL. He then said, "In my over 30 years as a radiologist I've never seen a tear like this. It is very difficult to tear one's PCL this badly." To which I replied, "Yeah, when I do something I try to do it right." Doing something right and doing the right thing are two different things entirely.

Congregations in mission for Christ focus more intentionally on doing the right things over and above doing things right. It's time churches begin to ask, "Lord, are we doing the right things?" In essence this is what we, RLC, are doing through the long range planning process. We are asking, "God, what are you doing and how can we partner with you in it?" This will help us discover what the right things are for us to do. And then do those things right.

Where does our belief come from?

As a member of the council, I have often wondered how we can increase our number of parishioners at Richland Lutheran Church. Our great commission tells us in **Matthew 28:18-20:**

Then Jesus came to them and said, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age."

How do we do that? Many people have lots of ideas of how to fulfill this commission but perhaps we must first look at how we became believers ourselves. Some of us were born into the faith. Our family believed and so do we. Other people have had a person in their life who greatly influenced their belief. Usually someone they loved or respected. Yet others may have had a great epiphany; a realization, and accepted Jesus.

As for me... my mother had faith but did not attend church nor took us to church. It was my grandfather who greatly influenced me the most. I remember the times in the summer when I would get to spend a week or two with my grandparents on their small farm. I would awaken at my grandparents' house, early in the morning before my siblings, and find my grandfather sitting at the kitchen window drinking a cup of coffee. We would sit together and gaze out the big picture window overlooking the pasture and watch the cows grazing. It was during several of these times that my grandfather spoke about his belief in God. He was very passionate that I believe too.

Also, during my elementary years, a lady from a neighboring church came to our house and invited us kids to come to Sunday school. She came each Sunday in her station wagon and picked up all the kids in the neighborhood that would come. She was the minister's wife. It was here that I learned about Jesus and the Bible. My belief was kindled by my grandfather but my religious education was fostered by the local church. However, you might find it interesting that I never considered myself a member of this church. Even as an elementary kid I knew that not all Christian churches believed the same and I didn't agree with several things about this church. I attended Sunday school to hear about God and Jesus.

When our family moved to Boise, Idaho, my sister and I were in high school. We decided we wanted to go to church. As I said earlier, we didn't agree with the neighborhood church we attended back home so we decided to try out a Lutheran Church (my grandmother was raised Lutheran in Minnesota where she grew up). We attended a couple of Sundays before we received a visit from the pastor of the church telling us that we could not take communion anymore because we were not members. I was upset! I grew up believing that communion was for all people who believed in Jesus and what he did for us. We believed the bread was the body of Jesus given for us and that the wine was the blood of Jesus shed for us. My sister and I never attended that church again and the pastor never followed up.

The following year we moved to the Tri-Cities. We were familiar with the Tri-Cities because we grew up in Walla Walla (50 miles away) and our grandparents lived in Kennewick. Six months after moving to Kennewick, I met my husband, Brian. It was on our first date that Brian asked me what my faith was! I was shocked! I had never had a date ask me what my faith was, especially on a first date. Here was this handsome, athletic, jock asking me what I believed in?! I was impressed. He invited me to come to church with him and we attended regularly and were married 1 ½ years later at Richland Lutheran Church.

After we graduated from Central Washington University, we moved back to the Tri-Cities to pursue our careers and start a family. We became active right away with RLC committee work and attended church regularly. When our children were born, they were baptized at RLC. I became the Sunday School Superintendent for twelve years until my grandparents became ill and I was needed for their care.

Feeling that everyone should do something in the church, I began lectoring. I lector and assist in communion every month. I enjoy being part of Richland Lutheran Church. It is home to me. I have been a member for over 36 years. Currently, I am also a member of the church council.

So, where does our faith come from? For me it was from the great love and influence that my grandfather had for me. I have been fortunate to have so many people in my life care about my faith. They shared their love. It is up to us to do the same. Be a good Christian, love your neighbors, share your faith, be active in your church, and model what you believe.

The Christian Disciple and the Energy Crisis

By now, most Richland Lutheran congregants are aware that many of my ideas for sermons and study of the Holy Bible occur to me while I'm showering. And yes, that means the Lord and I get lost in thoughts, resulting in some pretty l-o-n-g showers. This means it's advantageous for me to live in dwellings with large hot water tanks: as once the water temperature turns icy the only thought that occurs to me is, "Get out, fast!" Anyway, you might say that I owe it all to clean living!

Of course, the main Source of ideas is the Holy Spirit in the meditation of the texts of the Scriptures. But, there is another secondary source of material: the comic pages of the newspaper. I've been an avid reader of the comic section since I was a young boy; and now that I'm *not* a young boy, I *still* continue the practice. The comics are not always humorous. Certainly - to date myself - *Steve Canyon* and *Mary Worth* were not funny; they were more like an old radio serial like *The Romance of Helen Trent* (I'm ingratiating myself to people of a certain age by these reminiscences.) Having digressed far afield from this month's column title, let me give you some examples of how a couple of recent comics led to it.

Billy in *Family Circus* walks into the kitchen where his parents are eating breakfast and pronounces, "I've got a lot of stuff to do today. I just don't know what it is yet." Meanwhile, the aging cat *Garfield* begins his day by declaring, "I can't make up my mind. Should I do nothing? Or start to do something, and then quit?" So: the young child having nothing on his schedule, but with so much energy he already knows his day is just going to be packed - indeed already is packed with anticipation - versus the weary cat, whom we know will opt for a nap.

Parallel the brand new Christian and the long-term Christian. One, full of enthusiastic energy; the other, experiencing such energy loss that they're counting the moments to their first nap of the day. The younger will likely misuse the expenditure of their energies; the older desperately try to recoup their energies. Regarding the latter; no amount of "drill baby drill" in order to try and come up with lost energy by force of will is going to work. Concerning the former: unguided misuse of energy will expose them to unintended "fracking" by applying stress pressure resulting in them perhaps "burning out". Neither option is friendly



to the Christian growth and service environment. While the debate rages on about the usage of such measures in the *material universe*: in the *spiritual life*, both of these options *are* hazardous to your health.

As we head into Pentecost this month, consider the real Source of your energy for Christian living, the Holy Spirit. He has such renewable energy that according to **Romans 1:4** He "**declared with power**" our Lord and Savior to be God's Son in bodily resurrecting Jesus from the dead. The same Spirit which **II Corinthians 5:5** informs us every true Christian has as a down-payment guaranteeing our own resurrection; and in **John 16:13** will "**guide**" you into all truth. *That's* the Spirit!


