The NEW Good News Today

In November, the Good News Media Ministry (GNMM) Board approved funding to upgrade RLC's television broadcast capabilities. Our existing equipment, purchased in the early 1990's, was reaching its end-of-life and needed to be upgraded to the new digital HD television format. As part of this upgrade, the decision was made to address the audio portion of the broadcast, as the sound needs of the broadcast are considerable. As tightly as the GNMM and Sanctuary sound systems are coupled, this created an opportunity to upgrade the Sanctuary sound system as well with funding coming primarily from memorial funds. We are glad to announce that these upgrades are now complete and *Good News Today* will be broadcast for the first time in High Definition on June 30, 2013!

As we consider Christ's command of us to Make Disciples of All Men, there is much in the 21st century that challenges us. Our world is changing every day and we must continually make use of all that God has provided to spread the Good News of Jesus Christ. As the upgrades to the GNMM broadcast were planned, much consideration was given to the manner in which we communicate today. As the pioneers of GNMM knew, television is a great avenue to reach the unchurched. Did you know that our broadcast has a potential viewing audience of 650,000 people and extends to Spokane, Yakima, Wenatchee and Walla Walla in addition to the Tri-Cities? One of our challenges was to create a broadcast to capture new viewership. Consider: 5% of the potential audience represents more than 30,000 people hearing the Good News of Jesus Christ! But we didn't stop with TV alone; soon we will be using the Internet to webcast both Sunday services live to the entire world (that's 7 billion people!). Anyone who cares to watch will be able to use their computer to "tune in" to worship services at RLC! What a blessing for those of us who are not able to come to church—we will still be able to participate, wherever we happen to be, as long as we can get to our computer. And for those occasions such as weddings, children's programs, and other special events—we are now able to make those available on-line for those who cannot attend; Grandpa and Grandma can watch the Christmas program from their home in Hoboken!

Many other ideas are being considered and will soon be put in place and additional upgrades are planned. These are exciting times and our new system gives us the ability to produce content for television and for the Internet—the possibilities are endless! God has been very generous in supporting this important ministry. Together, we are most certainly Advancing His Kingdom and Making His Name Known! Today, we are doing this in many more ways than ever before!

If you are interested in working with this exciting ministry, please let Pastor Steve know. Making a broadcast or content for the Internet isn't hard; anyone can learn how to do it! From Pastor Steve



RLC in Mission for Christ: The Priesthood of All Believers

Congregations in Mission for Christ encourage all believers to serve in mission and ministry. This concept is not only biblical but also realized by Martin Luther in the early 1500s. Luther in <u>To the Christian Nobility in the German Nation</u> writes, "*That the pope or bishop anoints, makes tonsures, ordains, consecrates, or dresses differently from the laity, may make a hypocrite or an idolatrous oil-painted icon, but it in no way makes a Christian or spiritual human being. In fact, we are all consecrated priests through Baptism, as St. Peter in 1 Peter 2[:9] says, "You are a royal priesthood and a priestly kingdom," and Revelation [5:10], "Through your blood you have made us into priests and kings."*

The concept that all are "priests" is not a new one. For years this has been a foundation of our Christian doctrine. What hasn't been foundational is its practice. However, as Bob Dylan rightly said, "the times they are a changing." Congregations of all sizes, flavors, and backgrounds are beginning to equip, empower, and encourage all believers to serve in mission and ministry for the sake of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Recently I came upon an article written by Bob D'Ambrosio entitled, "Signs Your Church Encourages Serving." In this article he lists six basic statements that will help you identify areas where more attention is needed toward embracing the values of an equipping culture. I've listed them below for your consideration. As you read these and evaluate RLC you might notice we have a ways to go yet. But go we must!

* **Gift-based service is a frequent topic in worship messages.** Your church has a weekly opportunity to cast the vision for equipping. Does the lead pastor promote the biblical message of the giftedness of all believers? Do people understand that the call to discipleship involves service?

* Lay people are regularly and visibly lifted up as "heroes" for their service in the church and community. For equipping church values to permeate the culture, you have to do more than talk about them. Stories about and by people involved in service are key to building an equipping culture.

* **Paid staff are evaluated more by how they equip others than by program goals.** For example, was the children's ministry director evaluated by how many kids attended Vacation Bible School this summer or by how many volunteers served in that ministry? Is staff challenged to increase the number of people involved in their ministry each year?

* The church is known for being involved with ministry in the community. The natural outcome of healthy equipping churches includes involvement in community-transforming ministry. As you engage additional people in ministry, you won't have enough roles inside the church to accommodate the number of people willing to serve—therefore, you now have people for ministry placement within the community.

* Workplace and community involvement are seen as ministry. There is not a large division between sacred and secular service. Equipping is about people using their gifts in all that they do to glorify and serve God. That is part of the vision to cast in order to move towards whole life ministry.

* When people are sick or need pastoral care, they are more likely to be ministered to (and expect to be ministered to) by other lay people rather than pastoral staff. A hospital visit from a lay person is seen as real ministry. The senior pastor is not expected to make every hospital call, shut-in visit, or worship guest follow-up.

Financial Update

<u> Treasurer's Report – June 2013</u>

As reflected in the financial summary below, the financial results have been behind budget so far this year. Our offerings are down \$(30,730) or 9.1% less than last year for the same period. Our expenses are up \$49,836 or 16.8% more than the same time last year. For the year, our offerings are below expenses by \$(40,151) compared to \$40,415 in 2012, a change from last year of \$(80,567). These results are reflected in the columns titled "Prior Year Comparison".

For the year, actual offerings are below budget by \$(18,109) and actual expenses were over budget by \$17,185. The increased expense is primarily due to timing of the expense.

With summer just beginning, we encourage each of you to continually give faithfully and consistently throughout the summer. Historically, our giving during the summer months have been approximately 15% below the average giving for the year. Please remember that we still have staff salaries, utilities and other monthly expenses that occur during the summer months.

Consequently God's love has accomplished its mission among us.

As a way of accomplishing loving one another and growing in faith and relationship with the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, the council has formed a team to explore a small group ministry plan. The team is still praying and planning out this ministry right now, but the council believes that God is leading RLC down this path and we are willing to follow Him as He leads.

Family Ties

We've just come through Father's Day. Some may have already heard my description of Father's Day as: "*a good day's nap ruined*"! This has reference to the fact that just as "*dear old Dad*" settles down for his Sunday afternoon nap...the phone inevitably starts ringing. It's his grown children - perhaps abetted by his grandchildren - wishing him well on the occasion. This naturally leads to other conversation, and the afternoon (and evening) lengthens as we burn up the phone lines (our cell phones don't get good reception in our apartment for some reason).

Each of our children call in turn. The story-line in our household is that the order in which they contact Dad, determines their pecking order in my will. The joke is that there probably won't be anything left to distribute to them, since we've never been people of great personal means in accordance with the American Dream. Our daughter, Kerry, always wins this competition because she is an early riser who simply text messages me "Happy Father's Day!" Her greeting awaits me when I manage to rouse myself from sleep that morning. Meanwhile, all of our three sons are now also fathers. The oldest has children old enough that the whole event has come full circle and now he's understanding my feelings about Father's Day phone calls. The chickens have come home to roost.

We're now officially into those "*Lazy, Hazy, Crazy Days of Summer*". That means even *more* family. 'Tis the season for....*Family Reunions*. You know, the ones where you get to engage your lovable old crazy uncle, odd aunts, and a cousin whom everybody prefers to avoid. Family reunions are great! It's great to get to see everybody. Family reunions are disappointing! You always leave disappointed that in the midst of having to see *everybody* again, the in-depth visit you wanted to have with your favorite relative never got to take place; because in the midst of the necessity of seeing everybody, you could never quite carve out the time or space to have a more intimate visit with that person who is most special to you.

This summer, be encouraged that you can reach out to "*Our Father, Which Art in Heaven*" anytime of the day or night - or any day - to wish Him well by praising Him and thanking Him for just plain being Him. He's not napping, for "*He who watches over you will not slumber...nor sleep*" (Psalm 121:3,4). You needn't be concerned one of His children is getting more inheritance because you called on Him later. The contextual teaching of **Matthew 20:16**, "*...the last will be first, and the first will be last*", is a nice way of saying: by His grace His children finish in a dead heat. In our weekly Family Reunions of Word and Sacrament, we may fit that description in the old translation of **1 Peter 2:9** of being "*a peculiar people*"; but we are blood relatives at the Cross. Take time for intimate conversation and interaction with Jesus, your favorite relative at the Reunion. Don't neglect this worship: "*kneel*(ing) *before the Father, from Whom His whole family in heaven and earth derives its name*" (Ephesians 3:14, 15).

Parish Health Ministry

Maintaining Your Optimal Health

One Step at A Time

Parish Health wants to remind you to stay safe this summer by remembering the following:

- Drink enough water/fluids during the hot weather to avoid dehydration. If drinking fluids is difficult, consume fruits that contain liquid, such as watermelon or a Popsicle. Water not only decreases the chance of dehydration, but assists with weight loss as well.
- If hiking or walking in areas where ticks occur, especially long grass, minimize exposed skin areas and examine your body for ticks after your hike. Carefully remove any ticks (especially the head) you may find on yourself, children or pets. Tweezers are helpful with this. Ticks can carry Lyme disease that can cause a number of symptoms and medical concerns immediately and years to come.
- Mosquitoes can transmit West Nile Virus and other diseases. A stinger from an insect can be gently removed by backing it out by scraping it with your fingernail or credit card. Physicians recommend application of DEET to deter ticks as well as other insects. DEET is not recommended for children under 2 months of age.
- Rattlesnakes are found in our area. Keep this in mind when walking in the Northwest. If bitten, seek medical attention immediately. Keep in mind that rattlesnakes have been known to make their way into garages and houses as well.
- Be careful of poisonous spiders in our area. Spiders often seek refuge in the walls of your home and other inconspicuous places. Seek medical attention if you are bitten.
- Remember to wear sunscreen to avoid sun damage. Skin cancer can be deadly. Sunscreen needs to be re-applied every few hours while exposed to the sun. The higher the SPF, the higher the protection. Consider using a makeup with sunscreen or a moisturizer lotion that has sunscreen added. If you will be in the sun for prolonged periods of time or are especially sensitive, wear a hat and minimize your exposed skin. Sunglasses designed with UV ray protection is also necessary to protect your eyes.
- While picnicking, remember to keep hot foods hot or foods meant to be cold, cold. Do not leave uneaten food such as meats, casseroles, or salads out throughout the day for others to munch on unless the temperature is controlled properly.
- If cleaning out a shed, garage or other confined space, dispose of mouse droppings with care. Their feces can contain Hantavirus Pulmonary Syndrome (HPS). The disease is transmitted by the mouse and spread by breathing in the dust contaminated by the virus found in the feces. Seek medical attention if you experience symptoms similar to the flu (fever, headaches, muscle aches, stomach problems, dizziness, and chills) after your cleaning efforts.
- July 4th is upon us. Be extremely careful around fireworks as they can result in severe burns. Attending local community fireworks run by professionals is recommended.
- Use playgrounds that are properly maintained with equipment that is safe as well as the ground material below the equipment. Remember that equipment may become VERY HOT during our Tri-Cities summers. Make sure equipment such as slides are cool enough not to burn while using. Young children should be supervised while using the playground.
- Take care when selecting a bicycle and consider the child's size, coordination and balance. A properly fitted bicycle is necessary to keep your child safe. Teach your child to wear a properly fitted helmet on every bike ride, as many injuries occur in close proximity and in the yard of the child's home.
- Skateboarders, skaters and scooter-riders should wear protective gear such as helmets and knee pads. Skateboarding parks are great places to work on the user's skills in a safe environment.
- Common sense, protection and safety are needed when operating all-terrain vehicles. Children younger than driving age often lack the judgment and ability to operate the vehicle safely. ATV riders should take a hands-on safety training course, never ride double and wear a helmet, eye protection, sturdy shoes, and reflective clothing. A flag, reflector and lights make the ATV more visible to others.
- Wear sturdy shoes (no sandals) while mowing the lawn. Keep mowers and the safety equipment in good working order, wear eye protection from flying objects, and make sure the mower is off before unclogging or crossing nongrass areas.


