Stewardship 2014

King Henry III lived in Germany long ago. The king grew tired of his royal duties, so he applied to a monastery to become a monk. The religious superior of the monastery said to Henry, "Your Majesty, do you understand that to join this monastery you must become obedient to me as your religious superior? That will be hard because you have been king."

Henry replied, "I understand. The rest of my life I will be obedient to you, as Christ leads you."

"Then I will tell you what to do," said the leader of the monastery. "Go back to your throne and serve faithfully in the place where God has placed you."

That is exactly what King Henry did. When King Henry died, this statement was written about him: "The king learned to rule by being obedient."

We too can tire of our responsibilities. Like King Henry we need to be reminded that God has called us and equipped us to be faithful in our unique roles – be it as a plumber, accountant, mother, father, pastor, or teacher. God expects us to be faithful in our relationships with each other as well as our resources.

The story about King Henry and what he learned about being faithful to his call has implications for each of us today. Jesus taught us that faithfulness starts with the simple and everyday things of life. If each day's activities are a letter written to God, it should be our goal to sign off each night with the words "Faithfully Yours." (Article written by Beryl Jantzi and reprinted with permission)

RLC in Mission for Christ: Vision Drives Giving

From the Council

Stepping Out

Now that we are through with our major planning activities this year, have an approved budget, and mission plan for 2014, we can give thanks for the progress we have made and for the many blessings that have been bestowed on RLC and body of Christ followers.

In addition to the regular annual planning activities, we as a congregation adopted a long range plan this fall which is a unique document in that it is actually a "Guide and Vision". It is unlike any long range plan we have adopted in the past. As noted in the Introduction of the document, "This plan is not about the buildings or programs or organizational growth; rather it is about refining who we are-a Christ-focused body of believers working to accomplish the great commandment to "Go and make disciples of all men..." In short, it reestablishes the fundamental objectives of the role of the church in our lives and provides a set of objectives for all of us to work to accomplish."

The six primary objectives of the Guide and Vision are:

- Provide Opportunities for Spiritual Transformation
- Develop Christ-Centered Leaders
- Extend Missions
- Worship God with Praise and Thanks
- Expand Evangelism Efforts
- Use Our Resources to Advance God's Kingdom

These objectives were intentionally chosen by the Long Range Planning Committee to bolt up with our 2014 Ministry Plan, and to be supported by it. In reviewing the Ministry Plan, you will note that the following items are noted in the plan to specifically support our Guide and Vision:

- Enhance lighting in sanctuary to meet the ongoing ministry needs of corporate worship and GNMM.
- Organize and implement at least one high school small group.
- Implement a pastor led, corporate, adult Bible study on Wednesday evenings to coordinate with children and youth programs.
- By year's end have 60 (20% of 300) adults actively involved in small groups.
- Provide for an annual neighborhood block party to demonstrate the love of Jesus to our neighbors.
- Implement the Alpha course program, or similar program, to provide a non-threatening way for seekers to understand Christianity.
- Train ushers and greeters to intentionally welcome newcomers.
- Focus on local social justice issues of Hispanic non-citizens in the Tri-Cities.
- Develop a church-wide database of volunteers.
- Fill all Ministry Team Leader positions by year's end.
- Communicate expectation of "Every Member in Mission" to the congregation.
- Develop visitation ministry to include a strategically phased expansion based on our abilities to serve others.
- Make initial improvements to physical plant as architect recommends by year's end.

Both the Long Range Plan/Guide and Vision, and the Ministry Plan belong to the members of RLC, and we each, individually, share in the responsibility of their success. To that end, I urge each member to read through both documents and prayerfully consider what you are currently doing; what you might do in the near future to step out to grow your personal relationship with Christ, and make Jesus known to our community.

I'll Have You Know I'm Very Well Connected

Elaine and I've just come through that part of the autumn season we love so well. It commences with the two of us getting away to spend most of a week in Victoria, Canada (romance). Parish Health Ministry

You certainly don't want to end up like this little guy feeling under the weather! In order to decrease this from happening, get a flu shot this year. It is time for your annual shot before the flu season hits this winter. Flu shots are available at the Health Department, your doctor's office, and at your local pharmacy. I like to get mine at my local pharmacy because I can select a time that is convenient for me. Most pharmacies have a pharmacist available during the time the pharmacy is open. Insurance carriers including Medicare and Medicaid cover the flu shot so there is no cost to you. No prescription is needed to get a flu shot.

Almost everyone should get a flu shot except for those with life-threatening allergies to the flu vaccine (it contains eggs) or if you ever had Guillain-Barre Syndrome. If you are not feeling well it is suggested you wait until you are felling better. Children 6 months to 8 years should get two doses the first year they become vaccinated. A "high dose" vaccine is available for people 65 years of age and older.

The flu shot is made up of inactivated flu vaccine, although a different live, attenuated (weakened) vaccine is available and can be sprayed into the nostrils. Information specific to this type of vaccine is available from the CDC. The inactivated shot vaccine contains a small amount of mercury-based preservative (thimerosal) that has been shown in studies not to be harmful, but flu vaccines that do not have a preservative are available. There are risks of receiving the vaccine and side effects such as sore throat, muscle aches, fever/chills are possible. A full list of side effects will be given to you when receiving the vaccine.


