At the annual meeting in October 2013, the congregation voted to establish a special fund that would lead to implementation of one of the items in the newly adopted Long Range Plan. The fund was needed in order to hire an architect to evaluate our current facilities and develop a Facilities Strategic Plan.

The Cornerstone Fund was established with an initial goal of \$25,000. That goal was achieved and surpassed with congregational donations of \$13,136, matching funds from the RLC Foundation of \$12,500, and another \$4,000 from an anonymous member. We are now well-positioned to move forward with the architect! In fact, by the time you read this the contract between Richland Lutheran Church and Meier Architects and Engineering will be almost finalized.

You may remember the primary emphasis of the Long Range Plan was on spiritual development of our members and mission into the world. Though facilities were addressed, they were not the driving force behind the guide and vision for our future. That is why this fund is not the "building" fund. It is the Cornerstone Fund – a reminder that Jesus Christ is our sure foundation; and as we move forward in ministry, it will be our intent that whatever course is taken is in alignment with His will for this church.

You may be asking if gifts may still be given to the Cornerstone Fund. The answer is "Yes!" Regardless of what is ultimately recommended in the Facilities Strategic Plan, resources outside the operating budget will be needed to address many facility-related issues, especially since it has been nearly 30 years since our last major renovation.

President's Perspectives - Our Covenant

For most of the past decade the Church Council and our staff have used a governance model in which the Council controlled spending, defined what they wanted the staff to do or not do through policies, and then left the staff alone to get the ministries done for us. Communications between the Council and staff flowed strictly through the Lead Pastor.

Pastor Steve has wanted to change that to a true partnership in ministry between the Council and staff. Having served in a church where partnership was much more the governance model I very much want this also and I believe that the rest of the Council and staff do, too. But a true partnership requires us to truly trust each other (think of your spouse). Trust has to be worked for and earned and that takes time. Partnership in ministry means more collaboration between Council and staff.

Over the past four months we have made steady progress in this new way of working together. In January we held a Staff/Council Retreat in which Dr. Darrell Puls of Peacebridge Ministeries was invited to meet with us to help us learn how to be better partners. Now all the staff leads, and not just the Lead Pastor, are encouraged to attend Council meetings and provide their own reports of how ministries are going in their areas. Each month we invite a leader of a particular ministry to come spend a half hour telling us about the ministry, the people working on the ministry, and what is needed in support and resources to make that ministry more successful. Each Council member also agreed to serve on one or two ministry teams. I believe our priorities are changing.

One of the things Dr. Puls suggested was for us to develop a covenant to put in writing how we wanted to be treated by others (staff and Council members) as we labored together. A small task force of **Don Schmid**, **Ben Barr, Jenny Page, and Kelly Westlund** developed a covenant statement and in April the Council approved this outline for our treatment of each other and signed it as our personal commitment to do our best to live up to these ideals. I have summarized the Covenant below:

With the help of God we promise to:

1. **Respect**, care and pray for each other.

2. Assume people have good intentions and motivations.

3. **Participate** in decision making by speaking openly and honestly about priorities and opinions during meetings, not privately afterward.

4. Listen completely without interrupting or talking over others.

5. **Seek** what is best for the Church as a whole, not what is best for us or for some small group in the Church.

6. Accept differences of opinion and conflict as inevitable, normal and productive. When we disagree, we will do so respectfully.

7. **Seek** to hold the majority of our communication and decision making **face-to-face**. Seek to resolve conflict by communicating directly with the person or group involved, instead of gossiping or speaking negatively about others in the wider community.

8. **Forgive** each other and ourselves when we make mistakes even when another party to a conflict does not acknowledge their responsibility.

9. **Maintain** the integrity of the Council by not breaking confidentiality or undermining the Council and its decisions.

10. Support the final decision of the Church Council whether it reflects your view or not.

President's Perspecitves, Continued

In reviewing this Covenant and writing this article I was struck by how many of these ten principles should apply to all church members. Jesus commanded us to love our fellow Christians: "A new command I give you: love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another. **By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another." (John 13:34-35, NIV). Unfortunately, the Church has become infamous at times for the strife and conflict among its saints. As Paul wrote to the Corinthians: "For I am afraid that when I come I may not find you as I want you to be, and you may not find me as you want me to be. I fear that there may be discord, jealousy, fits of rage, selfish ambition, slander, gossip, arrogance and disorder." (2 Corinthians 12:20, NIV).**

Commit to applying these covenant principles to your own interactions with fellow Christians and may God's peace and grace be with you all.

Why Not Celebrate His Resurrection Every Week - Not Just on Easter

Having just passed through the holiest season of the church calendar for Christians culminating in Christ's resurrection, I'm struck by how blessed we are since "God so loved the world," He gave His son on the cross for our sins. But the frosting on my cake, and I pray for everyone's, is the resurrection.

I would like to propose that every Sabbath or Sunday worship (yes Saturday night counts too) is every bit a "resurrection" to which we can attach importance and significance as much as we do on Easter Sunday.

Christ's victory over sin and death by his resurrection assures us of eternal life for "whoever believes in him shall not perish." Isn't that why we feel so glorious on Easter morning, knowing Jesus Christ has prevailed for us not only on the cross but against sin and death when he rose from the dead?

I am a Russian linguist and on my mission trip to Russia two years ago with RLC's team I embraced the Russian word for Sunday. The word translates in English to "resurrection" or "rising from the dead" or "revival." Whether anyone pays attention or not, at least Russian Christians "in my mind" pay homage to Christ's resurrection every Sunday.

Praising God and inviting Jesus into our hearts in all we do, in everything we say and in all our thoughts and prayers at RLC is a celebration of His resurrection. We don't stop there. When we implement our church vision of "making Christ known to people and advancing His kingdom" we celebrate His resurrection. Wow, that's cool, as Pastor Corey would say.

New Sermon Series - 1 John

The Apostle Paul encourages his young pastor apprentice Timothy in 1 Timothy 4:13 to, "Devote yourself to the public reading of Scripture, to preaching and to teaching." This encouragement from Paul to Timothy is a good reminder and even encouragement to us to devote ourselves at Richland Lutheran to the reading, preaching, and teaching of Scripture.

With this in mind, Richland Lutheran will be going through the book of 1 John starting the week after Easter.

1 John was written by John, son of Zebedee (see Mk 1:19-20) -- the apostle and the author of the Gospel of John and Revelation (see Introductions to both books: Author). He was a fisherman, one of Jesus' inner circle (together with James and Peter), and "the disciple whom Jesus loved." 1 John was written to believers of Jesus Christ with two basic purposes in mind: One, to expose false teachers (2:26) and two, to give believers assurance of salvation (5:13). In keeping with his intention to combat Gnostic teachers, John specifically struck at their total lack of morality (3:8-10); and by giving eyewitness testimony to the incarnation, he sought to confirm his readers' belief in the incarnate Christ (1:3). Success in this would give the writer joy (1:4).

Devolution?

You may be curious as to the title/subject of our column; perhaps thinking within a couple of months from Independence Day, I am to talk about *revolution* and the breaking away from the royalty across the Pond. Others may figure my intent is to present a rant against - or a concession to - a hot topic to many Christians: *evolution*. Either way, you'd imagine my title is a misprint. You'd be wrong. I'm solely responsible for errors in typing, grammar or (gulp) facts. The title is correct. Whereas, according to one definition, *evolution* refers to a process of development or gradual *progressive* change: *devolution* can refer to its opposite - a process of *degeneration* instead of progress.

An advantage to aging is the ability to look back over one's lifetime and evaluate. I speak for most Christians who've reached a *certain* age when I say that we've lived long enough to see a *lot* of progress in our lifetime: scientifically, technologically, medically, etc. This is self-evident. I grew up in an era of polio; and lived to see the vaccine to prevent it - thank you, Dr. Jonas Salk! But there are other areas where we've lived to see the manifest degeneration of a culture. What's worse: it rears its ugly head within Christianity, too. Spatially, a column can't contain elaboration of specifics. I don't have in mind some of the laughable "no-no's" that inhabited large segments of Christian culture in days gone by. I'm not even yearning for "the good old days". I do have in mind the advantages available to the modern Church/churches (a good thing) accompanied by a moral declension and muddying of the message (a really bad thing) in our Christian lifestyle, commitment and teaching (things *intended* to give evidence that we really *have* been/are with Jesus). Instead, we look, sound and increasingly conduct ourselves like, well: the world. Each generation of Christians takes note of this. There's always been a remnant who've prayed, giving God the right to sovereignly intervene with revival. So the Church persists to this day. I get concerned about my children and grandchildren: the type of society and possibly watered-down form of Christianity they'll inherit. Our *best* practice is Jesus' advice to a Peter concerned about the apostle John coming behind him: that we follow hard after Jesus as the antidote (John 21:22, 23).

A Desert Father asked what will happen in the last generation: "We now desire to fulfill the commandments of God." They then asked: "What about those who will come after us?" Answer: "Perhaps half will desire to keep God's commandments and seek God." Follow-up: "Those who come after these, what shall they do?" Answer: "The men of that generation will not have the desire of God's commandments. At that time wickedness will overflow and the charity of many will grow cold. And there shall come upon them a terrible testing. *Those who will be found worthy in this testing will be better than we are and better than our fathers.*" Read **Matthew 24:4-14** (especially **vv. 10-13**). Persevere in faith!

meets at 5:30pm in the Friendship Room. If you are interested in deepening your faith and growing closer to other Christ-followers, this may be the group for you!




May's "Items of the Month" are: Gifts for younger girls age 5-9.


