Focus, Grasshopper

Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles. And let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us, ²fixing our eyes on Jesus, the pioneer and perfecter of faith. For the joy set before him he endured the cross, scorning its shame, and sat down at the right hand of the throne of God. ³Consider him who endured such opposition from sinners, so that you will not grow weary and lose heart. –Romans 12:1-3

"Grasshopper," used in the TV series "Kung Fu" by Caine's Shaolin master as a term of affection and endearment for his young apprentice. "Focus," used by Mr. Miyagi to instruct Daniel how to break six blocks of ice while he himself "prays." Though we're not training to learn and practice Kung Fu, we are indeed training for righteousness, as the Apostle Paul writes to Timothy in 2 Timothy 3:16. Perhaps we could use these words of Kung Fu masters, "Focus, Grasshopper," to encourage us to train for the Kingdom of God.

Isn't this what the writer of Hebrews is basically saying in their opening words of chapter twelve? One, a wise one, does not run a race without first training. And training takes focus. Many years ago now, I was talked into running a half-marathon. Truth be told, though I've always been athletic, I've never been interested in running. I'm convinced God gave us the ability to run only because we might be chased. Christopher McDougall says, "Every morning in Africa, a gazelle wakes up, it knows it must outrun the fastest lion or it will be killed. Every morning in Africa, a lion wakes up. It knows it must run faster than the slowest gazelle, or it will starve. It doesn't matter whether you're the lion or a gazelle – when the sun comes up, you'd better be running." Some have used this to motivate their running. I use it as a reminder that I'm neither gazelle nor lion. But I digress. The point is, without extensive training I would not have been able to complete 13.1 miles.

Fellow Kingdom grasshoppers, have you grown weary and lost heart in your training for righteousness? Be encouraged to focus on what really matters. To "fix your eyes on Jesus, the pioneer and perfecter of faith." Don't try harder, but train closer. Closer to the One who endured the cross and sits on the throne. Get back to what who really matters, Jesus. He's longing to be your master. To train you for a life of faith and obedience. Shed the hindrances and sin that easily entangle and focus, grasshopper!

Getting to Know Pastor Sam

Beginning on June 4, 2019, I became an employee of Richland Lutheran Church as an Interim Associate Pastor. The job description says that my main purpose will be: "to provide Spiritual care to the congregation, coordinating urgent and ongoing visitation needs in partnership with the visitation team." This ministry was one of the many ministries of which Pastor Corey was overseer, so my presence is meant to continue his work while he is on Sabbatical.

My main responsibilities will be to oversee and assist the men and women who are part of the visitation ministry of the church. Whenever I have been a member of the leadership team in any organization, one of the first things I have always tried to do is to get to know those that I will be working with, or who are members of a volunteer program that I am overseeing. I do that because I have learned that visiting with the members of a group will teach me about the work that they are doing, and because they will be the ones to show me how I can support them, and help them, as they do this work for the church. It is my hope that by the time this goes to print I will have met with most of the members of the visitation team.

As I thought about what it means to provide care for the people who provide care for others, I was reminded of one of the many lessons that Jesus taught to his disciples. In John 13:34-35 [RSV] Jesus says, "A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another; even as I have loved you, that you also love one another. By this all people will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."

One way in which we show to the whole world what love for others looks like, is for the people of the world--who are not yet followers of Christ Jesus--to see how we care for, and love, the very people who are followers of Jesus. The visitation team visits those who may have a difficult time getting out of the house; or who may be ill; or are in a hospital; or who may just need a friend so as I think about this commandment of Jesus', it makes me realize that our visitation team is fulfilling this command that Jesus gave to his earliest disciples to "have love for one another."

My job description says that I, too, will make visits to see those in need and that I will assist Pastor Steve with any hospital and other more emergency circumstances, if they arise.

During my time as an Associate Pastor I will be using Pastor Corey's office. My regular office hours will be Tuesday and Wednesday afternoons between 1:00-4:00 PM. That does not necessarily mean that I will be in the office during those hours, but those are the times when I will be available to meet with anyone who has a need for Pastoral or Spiritual Counseling. That schedule is not written in stone, so if there is a pastoral need that you feel would be helpful to talk about, please call the office and Kelly can arrange a time for us to meet.

President's Perspectives - Religion with Chinese Characteristics

Dave Larkin, Council President In the approximately 4,000 years, from the time of Abraham until the death and resurrection of Jesus, God's interactions with the peoples of the world was largely restricted to his chosen people, the Jews. That all changed just before the ascension of Jesus to heaven with what we call the *Great Commission*. Mark, in chapter 16 of his gospel, reported that Jesus spoke to his disciples and ¹⁵ "He said to them, "Go into all the world and preach the gospel to all creation."

Over the past five years Carol and I have visited Turkey, Israel, Jordan, and China – all parts of the world Jesus included in his commission but whose population does not have Christian traditions embedded in their culture. We just returned from three weeks in China which unlike Israel, Turkey and Jordan does not even have a monotheistic tradition. We are still working through in our minds all we learned, and reaching conclusions. So what did we learn about China, and what does it say about the progress of the Great Commission there and whether his kingdom is advancing in that region of the world?

One of the most meaningful discussions our group had with our main Chinese guide and a local guide in the city of Xian had to do with their search for spiritual meaning. Our main guide "George" had a family that lived through the Cultural Revolution. His parents were selected as husband and wife by the Communist party. They were "educated" to reject all religions and to put the Party and its directions before any personal desire. They were encouraged to report, torture, and even kill fellow workers who did not totally agree with the Party. Because they were intellectuals, his parents were sent to the countryside during the Cultural Revolution while the two boys were left in Beijing on their own. At the time, they were just nine and eleven years old. They received money from the government and could eat in a commune cafeteria. But, because of their parent's situation, the other children bullied them.

Communist propaganda was very strong during "George's" childhood. Each morning the two boys heard the song "The East is Red." When he awoke the first thing he saw was a photograph of Chairman Mao. There were over two hundred photographs of Chairman Mao on the walls of their home. The first activity of each day was to pray that Chairman Mao would have a long life. At the minimal school they attended they studied Mao's Little Red Book for two hours each day.

George told us that about seven years ago he began to be very concerned by the lack of any objective ethical standards in China. He saw that people had chosen to cooperate and support the Party and government in return for job security and economic improvement in their lives. In return for "things" and more freedom in choosing their spouses and careers they were willing to give up other freedoms, including religion. Most government jobs require being a member of the Communist party and any religious practice by a member is forbidden. George's solution has been to commit to Confucian ethics and principles but to also be a "Just-in-case Buddhist and Taoist." He is very concerned about the Chinese society's future without some higher principles. George, his wife, and little son spent three months in the U.S. and the son attended a church-run preschool. While we were on tour, we met him and he sang a song he had learned at school based on the song "I'm in the Lord's Army." God can use these small circumstances to move George on his spiritual path.

The local guide we talked to had much the same concerns and personal solutions.

While George and others in their spiritual search have not come to a belief in God or Jesus, I find hope that they have experienced a need in their hearts. Official surveys indicate that there may be at least 31 million Christians in China today while some estimates exceed 100 million. But religion is tightly controlled by the government and control is being increased recently, including the arrest of leaders of unofficial house or underground Chris-

This would include preaching, serving as a liturgist, and handling memorial services, as needed." I usually attend the 5 o'clock Sunday evening worship service and I just signed up to provide worship assistance in that service; but I may also assist at other services, as well.

On a more personal note, my wife Christy and I have been married for a little over 35 years and together we raised four children; all of whom are now adults. When we married, Christy had two children from her first marriage, and after we married she and I had two more together. We also have two grandchildren, but unfortunately they do not live in the Tri-Cities. tian churches.

The government has a say in selection of pastors and the definition of doctrine for officially approved churches. This reminds me of a Chinese government saying. They say they have adopted Capitalism but with Chinese characteristics. The government seems to be approving Christianity so long as it has Chinese characteristics.

Missionary efforts or even support from Christians from other countries is totally unacceptable by the government. In addition to the Communist opposition to religion, there is a historical basis for this opposition. In the last half of the 19th century, Western countries forced the Chinese to give them land and privileges for trading. Along with those they forced the government to allow Christian missionaries to work unimpeded in China. These humiliating developments have left the Chinese people with deep insecurity when confronted with the Western world.

My conclusion is that Chinese people are hungry for a deeper spiritual purpose in their lives. Christianity is still a minor player but is growing. Because missionary work by other countries is not acceptable, our duty is to pray for the Chinese Christians and for their brave pastors. I will be praying for George, his wife Charlene, and his son, who he calls "Little Potato."

RLC Scrip Program: Mission Accomplished!

Last December we were looking for a way to highlight our Food Pantry ministry and generate income for this important and well-used service to our community. After consideration and prayer, we decided to try the ShopwithScrip program here at RLC. This program has worked at many congregations nationwide.

It's now been six months and, as with every new ministry at RLC, we've spent time reconsidering, evaluating and praying through its efficacy and we've come to several conclusions.

- The original intent of the Scrip program has been accomplished. <u>We have highlighted our Food Pantry ministry and received greater income</u>.
- Though we met our intended outcome, it hasn't been as we expected. Our expectation was that we'd generate funding through the program itself. However, few are using the program regularly, but <u>direct donations to the ministry have increased greatly</u>.
- The Scrip program <u>doesn't include many stores/businesses our congregation frequents</u>, like; WinCo, Fred Meyer, Yolks, Sterling's, and other local businesses.

Given these realities, we've decided that the Scrip program simply does not fit our congregation. We'll continue to highlight the Food Pantry ministry and, of course, receive donations. We encourage you to remember this important outreach to our neighbors in prayer, and as God leads, financially.

We want to especially thank Don Grewe for his administration of the program these last six months. With his efforts, the Food Pantry ministry has met its goals and we are confident this will continue for years to come. Mission Accomplished!
