## RLC COVID-19 Safety Planning Team Update April 2021

Greetings friends and partners in ministry at Richland Lutheran Church. It's hard to believe we've been working diligently at RLC to reduce the risk of exposure to and mitigate the outbreak of COVID-19 for over a year now. Because we take the health and safety of our members, regular attendees, guests and visitors very seriously and because we adhere to the admonition of Scripture to "be subject to the governing authorities" (c.f. Romans 13:1-7 and 1 Peter 2:13-17), we've taken a conservative and compliant approach to reopening our facilities. We do recognize not every church has taken this approach and not every person agrees with it. Being aware of this, we, all the more, appreciate your continued patience, acceptance and support of this very demanding and difficult work.

The latest update came March 22, when the governor moved Benton County into phase 3 of his reopening plan. Under "Religious and Faith-based Organizations COVID-19 Requirements," the governor has updated the plan from phase 2 to include, among other guidance:

- Indoor services at a place of worship with up to 50% not to exceed 400
- Hold outdoor services of unlimited capacity with a recommended max of 400
- Provide in-home services with up to 10 total individuals

The plan defines these services as "all worship services, religious study classes, religious ceremonies, and religious holiday celebrations."

General guidelines, including CDC and OSHA requirements, allow for staff to return to on-site work and for the office to be opened. Subsequently, 1) all staff will return to on-site work at RLC on Monday, April 12, and 2) the church office will open with regular hours; Monday through Thursday 9:00 AM - 4:00 PM, and Friday 9:00 AM - 12:00 PM. Furthermore, guidelines include "Indoor Social Gatherings," which allows for up

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# The Importance of Honesty, Transparency, and Vulnerability and the Church

# From Pastor Steve, Lead Pastor



The number one reason non-Christians say they don't want to go to church is the perceived, and sometimes real, hypocrisy of those who constitute the church, Christians. We act as if we've got life together, figured out, perfected, when in reality we're as sinful, broken, hurting as anyone else, yet we hide our true selves from others. Think about it, if this was your perspective of Christians, either right or wrong, why would you want to be a part of that? I wouldn't.

I'm wondering if honesty, transparency and vulnerability would help to assuage the non-Christian's perception of the church and followers of Jesus Christ? What if instead of living in the shallow waters of faith and life, we venture into the depths of authenticity and really start to swim? What if instead of concerning ourselves with outward appearances, we tended to the inner self? What if instead of presenting our false selves to the world, we show ourselves for who we truly are?

This is what Jesus was getting at when he addressed the Pharisees for their hypocrisy in Matthew 23, "Woe to you, teachers of the law and Pharisees, you hypocrites! You clean the outside of the cup and dish, but inside they are full of greed and selfindulgence... Woe to you, teachers of the law and Pharisees, you hypocrites! You are like whitewashed tombs, which look beautiful on the outside but on the inside are full of the bones of the dead and everything unclean." Here, Jesus is teaching two things. One, tend to the depths not the surface of faith and life, and two, show your brokenness, sin, uncleanliness and hurt as they really are. The latter is an exhortation to honesty, transparency and vulnerability. I believe Jesus encourages this for many reasons,

let me give you four of them.

1. Honesty, Transparency and Vulnerability Open Wide the Door for **Evangelism** 

Let's be honest! People, especially non-Christians, don't want to hear about your perfect life, your perfect spouse, your perfect kids, your perfect job, your perfect parents, your perfect house, your perfect pets, your perfect retirement, your perfect church, your perfect faith. Why? Because they know the truth, you don't have a perfect life, spouse, kids, job, parents, house, pets, retirement, church, faith. There really is no such thing this side of the kingdom fulfilled and non-Christians know this better than anyone.

Here's an idea, why not share your struggles, your fears, what keeps you up at night, your temptations, your failures, the things which bring you shame with a non -Christian? Speak of your imperfections which will be relatable to them and provide a great opportunity to speak of God's mercy, grace and unending love through the person and work of Jesus Christ.

#### 2. Honesty, Transparency and Vulnerability Allow Us to Bear One-**Another's Burdens**

Paul is clear to the church at Galatia to, "Carry each other's burdens, and in this way you will fulfill the law of Christ." This can only happen when we are being honest, transparent and vulnerable with one another. This Jesus way of life flies in the face of American individualism. We Lutherans, perhaps it is our predominate German and Scandinavian heritage, are simply not comfortable in this space.

What if, instead of presenting our false selves to the world, we show ourselves for who we truly are?

Here's an idea, why not share your struggles, your fears, what keeps you up at night, your temptations, your failures, the things which bring you shame with a Christian? Share with a trusted friend and fellow member at RLC and allow them the privilege to bear these burdens with you. Or, find someone willing to share with you their struggles, fears and the rest and offer to carry their burdens with them. Or really start swimming and do both!

3. Honesty, Transparency and Vulnerability Provide Space to Repent Now for something truly mortifying! Perhaps a dive into the deep end from the platform. James says to the church in Jerusalem, "Confess your sins to each other and pray for each other so that you may be healed. The prayer of a righteous person is powerful and effective." Yikes! Certainly James isn't serious about this, is he? I mean, come on, enough is enough!

Here's an idea, why not share your struggles, your fears, what keeps you up at night, your temptations, your failures, the things which bring you shame as a

proper way to confess, repent and receive forgiveness? What a blessing it would be to unpack and release the baggage we carry from unconfessed sin. 4. Honesty, Transparency and Vulnerability Create Accountability

Jesus said, "Things that cause people to stumble are bound to come, but woe to anyone through whom they come. It would be better for them to be thrown into the sea with a millstone tied around their neck than to cause one of these little ones to stumble. So watch yourselves. If your brother or sister sins against you, rebuke them; and if they repent, forgive them." The pronoun here is plural, 'yourselves.' We are to watch one-another to keep each other from stumbling into sin. This is accountability. But, we can't be accountable to each other without first talking authentically about the things which tempt us and lead us to sin.

Here's an idea, why not share your struggles, your fears, what keeps you up at night, your temptations, your failures, the things which bring you shame as a way to enter into an accountable relationship. I know I couldn't live a healthy Christian life without the accountable relationships I live in today.

Our "motto" at RLC is "Doing Life Together." There is no real way to do this if we are only going to swim in the shallow end of the pool of faith and life with each other. Sure, we can splash around a little bit with our coffee and fellowship, but no real swimming will be accomplished. We can keep relationships at arm's length, tiptoe around the surface, hide with our masks.

However, the truth is, if you don't share your struggles, your fears, what keeps you up at night, your temptations, your failures, the things which bring you shame, we don't really know you. And if we don't really know you we can't really do life together. And if we can't really do life together, we can't carry your burdens, provide space to repent, create accountability. And if we can't really do these things, are we really even the church? I wonder?

Grace and Peace,

# President's Message: The Vine and the Branches From Sandy Steele, Congregation President

John 15:5-8 "I am the vine; you are the branches. If you remain in me and I in you, you will bear much fruit; apart from me you can do nothing. If you do not remain in me, you are like a branch that is thrown away and withers; such branches are picked up, thrown into the fire and burned. If you remain in me and my words remain in you, ask whatever you wish, and it will be done for you. This is to my Father's glory, that you bear much fruit, showing yourselves to be my disciples."

This is one of my favorite passages. Every time I hear these words, as I did during one of Pastor Steve's sermons a few Sundays ago, it brings to mind memories of my parents as grape growers. Yes, I grew up on a vineyard in Pasco. Having grown up on that vineyard and watching my father at work caring for and pruning the crops, I have a pretty good grasp as to how it works — how the branches bear fruit as they grow from and depend upon the vine for nourishment and how those branches are pruned so they can be healthy and fruitful. This image helps me to better envision and understand Jesus as the Vine and us as the branches. The branches draw life from the Vine. God prunes us so we can bear much fruit. He prunes us of the worldliness around us, the busyness and other distractions that get in our way of having a true relationship with Him.

I recommend to you a book entitled "In My Father's Vineyard" by Wayne Jacobean. He writes about his years of growing up on a vineyard in California and relates it to lessons we, as Christians, can learn from the vine and the branches. It's a quick and easy read and one that I found enjoyable and relatable – at least for me.

I not only grew up on a vineyard, but later in my adult life I moved back into a newly built house nestled amongst this same vineyard and I lived there for several years near my parents. I always felt so safe and snug as though I were nestled in the arms of our Lord. What a beautiful place it was AND what a beautiful place to be. The vineyard is no longer there and I am now in north Richland but this vineyard in Pasco will forever be in my heart – just like "my Father's vineyard".

I recently ran across this "Reflection" that I'd like to now share with you – author unknown.

# **Staying Connected**

#### From Pastor Sam, Visitation Pastor

We have just spent this past year living our lives governed by the presence of a pandemic caused by a virus. What has been difficult for me is that I have been unable to get together with friends and colleagues for worship services, fellowship, Bible study, and the many other things that were part of my life before the virus appeared.

When I look back over this past year what I notice was how important my own devotional life had become to me. It sounds odd for me to write those words but for the most part the only real connection I have had to a life of faith was the time I had each day in prayer meditation: because with opportunity to live my faith in the company of others, all that was really left was my time alone with God. And the one devotional source that I did have for the whole year is a devotional book titled 'A Guide to Prayer for Ministers and Other Servants'.

It is a book I first began to use when I was serving as a pastor in the Methodist church and for the past year it has been my sole guide in how I pray, meditate, read and study what it means for me to be a follower of Christ Jesus. I first began to use this spiritual guide during the 3<sup>rd</sup> week of Lent in 2013 and what I have recently begun to realize was how much it had become such a stable source for my own spiritual life during the past year.

As I reflect upon that thought it surprises me how much this devotional book has done for me as it guides me into keeping the spiritual practices that I have been following for many years. And it is that stability and familiarity that this devotional has provided, and the

scriptures and prayers that it gives me to read each year that I go through it, that I am reminded of the faithfulness and stability that God has been for me during this time as well.

Do you have something like that which has guided and sustained you in your own faith during the pandemic? I know there are many devotional books that we have available to us whose purpose is to help us live spiritual lives such as 'Our Daily Bread' or the Methodist 'Upper Room'; and my question for each of us is how did you keep the faith during this time of your life?

As we enter the second year of the pandemic, [which I also hope—with God's grace and the advent of vaccines—is about to end] that you remember what helped you during this time. And if it was a devotional guide such as the book I used, or an online daily bible verse or anything else like that, remember to give thanks for whatever it was that helped you to keep your faith in the ever present Spirit and saving grace of Jesus Christ.
