Could 2020 be a Sabbath Year for RLC?

From Pastor Steve, Lead Pastor

When you think about 2020 it's difficult to put a positive spin on it. Global pandemic, heightened racial tension and injustice, myriad natural disasters, angry and bitter politics, and the rest leave us lamenting this blasted year and desiring to move past it as fast as we can and never look back. However, is there anything good we can say about 2020? I wonder? Could God use such a disastrous year as this for his good? I know the Bible says, "In all things God works for the good of those who love him, who have been called according to his purpose" (Rom. 8:28, NIV), but 2020 may be beyond even God's redemption. We know this isn't true, but it feels that way.

Last week, Congregational President Sandy Steele and I were meeting together after a great Congregation Council meeting and considering what things might look like when we get back to "normal," whatever that's going to be. It was fun to imagine and dream together about what ministry will look like post COVID-19. Sandy and I agree God has great plans for us, Richland Lutheran Church, next year. Furthermore, we believe God has been preparing us in 2020 to be ready for what he is planning for us in 2021. I liken what God has been doing in 2020 to the Old Testament command of *The Sabbath Year*. In Leviticus chapter 25, as Moses meets with God on Mount Sinai, God speaks to Moses and says,

Speak to the Israelites and say to them: 'When you enter the land I am going to give you, the land itself must observe a Sabbath to the Lord. For six years sow your fields, and for six years prune your vineyards and gather their crops. But in the seventh year the land is to have a year of Sabbath rest, a Sabbath to the Lord. Do not sow your fields or prune your vineyards. Do not reap what grows of itself or harvest the grapes of your untended vines. The land is to have a year of rest.'

I wonder, is this the Sabbath year of rest for our church? Our ministry? Is God preparing us for what is to come? Could God be using this difficult time "for the good of those who love him, who have been called according to his purpose?" I am convinced God is! Though a forced Sabbath year it is, it is still, in many ways, a Sabbath year. The key is, will this Sabbath be a "Sabbath to the Lord?"

A year of rest, a Sabbath year, doesn't necessarily need to be given to the Lord. Academia practices a Sabbath year, sabbatical, but doesn't necessarily give it to the Lord. Farmers practice Sabbath, fallow, but don't necessarily give it to the Lord. The military practices Sabbath, furlough, but doesn't give it to the Lord. The concept is the same in all Sabbath practices, but it takes intentionality to give a Sabbath to the Lord. To give a Sabbath to the Lord, we must be intentional. And that's exactly what I'm encouraging you to do.

Would you prayerfully consider giving the Lord 2020 as a Sabbath year? Perhaps you're already doing this, I know many of you are. As you've been forced to slow and rest many of you have been intentional about giving this time to the Lord. Bible study, devotionals, prayer, meditation, simplicity, silence and solitude have been some of the spiritual formation habits you've been practicing to do this. If this is you, keep at it! If you haven't been intentional about giving 2020 to the Lord, it's not too late. Truth be told, it looks like we have at least another half year to go before things get back to "normal." I wonder how God would bless us, RLC, and our ministry if all of us practiced a Sabbath year given to the Lord. What could God do? What will God do?

I'll leave you with a benediction of the Apostle Paul as a way to imagine with me and Sandy about the great things God will do after this year of Sabbath. "Now to him who is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine, according to his power that is at work within us, to him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus throughout all generations, for ever and ever! Amen."

It is a well-known reality that when most people regularly attend church they tend sit in the same place each week. I remember a story my wife told me that one Sunday she put her purse on a seat then had to leave for a moment and when she returned the couple that usually sat in those seats had moved her purse; it seems as if sometimes old habits and traditions are hard to change. So what are some reasons that people do sit in the same seats every Sunday?

One reason may be because it is easy to hear what is being said, or to see what's going on during the worship service. Parents will often sit where it is easy to take a child out of the sanctuary who is struggling to sit still. But it seems as if one of the main reasons that most people sit in the same seats each week is because that is where their family and friends sit. We all want to be in worship in the company of the people that we love and care about. These are the people with whom we pray, with whom we worship, and are the people with whom we live this life of faith.

It also helps to remember that Jesus, too, had friends and family with whom he must also have attended services in the synagogue. Throughout his time among the people of Israel, he spent much time with the twelve disciples and the many other people who accompanied him.

Jesus maintained a friendship with the family of Mary and Martha and their

brother Lazarus; he had meals with them, shared lessons with them, and even raised Lazarus from the dead. This is a family that Jesus seemed to have spent much time with and they seem to have been a family for whom he had much love.

I mention all of this because for much of 2020 we have not been able to spend much time with our pew neighbors. Prior to the pandemic, I usually attended the 5:00 Sunday evening service and sat near Marcia and Kelly, and Jeri and Tom; in other words I attended worship with people who are my friends and, because of the pandemic, I have not seen most of them for almost a year.

In John 13:34-35 Jesus said, "A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another; even as I have loved you, that you also love one another. By this all men will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."

As we begin a new year remember this lesson of Jesus and make some kind of connection with those people with whom you used sit with during worship. Take a few moments to make a phone call, or send an email, or post a message on Facebook, or whatever works for you; and let them know that you miss them and that you too look forward to the day when we can all worship together in one place.

RLC Church Staffing 2021 From Pastor Steve

As you no doubt know, our congregation has been working diligently since Pastor Corey's resignation in late August to consider staffing at RLC. Immediately upon news of Pastor Corey's resignation, I hired, and the Council later extended, two interim positions. The Interim Contemporary Music Coordinator, filled by our own Susie Nunamaker and the Interim Visitation Pastor, filled by another RLC member, Pastor Sam Geyer. Closely thereafter, two Council Committees were formed to consider how we wanted to staff going into 2021 and beyond. The first committee, Staffing Review, was activated by the Congregation Council at their September meeting to consider our current staffing configuration and the best way to proceed into the future. Jon Erlandson, Jeff Pilger, Marilyn Ball, Valerie Silva (Council Member) and I began work to this end. Our Congregational President, Sandy Steele, sat in during most of our meetings.

This committee met weekly to discuss the best way to ensure that all of Pastor Corey's former responsibilities in ministry and mission would continue to be met. Their work included, but wasn't limited to, reviewing the current configuration and job descriptions and responsibilities of each staff position; speaking with current staff to review their current job descriptions to ensure all areas were relevant and up to date; and, discerning together what parts of current staff positions could be shuffled around to better meet congregational needs and staff gifts and abilities. This discernment process also included discovering items that could, and perhaps should, be handled by RLC members.

After a solid three months of meeting together and much work, the committee recommended and the Congregation Council unanimously approved the following conclusions and recommendations:

- Pastor Corey was serving as Associate Pastor and as Contemporary Music Coordinator. Each area was evaluated, respectively.
- We recommend that the Associate Pastor position not be filled at this time.
- Susie Nunamaker was contacted and satisfied with her position as Traditional Music Coordinator and no changes were made for that job description.
- The committee reviewed the Interim Contemporary Music Coordinator position, and recommends the CMC position be made regular, confident that this will ensure that Pastor Corey's former responsibilities are covered. This role may be combined with the Traditional Music Coordinator.
- The committee reviewed the Interim Visitation Pastor position and recommends that the position be made regular. This will go a long way in providing for visitation and prayer ministry, which were major responsibilities of Pastor Corey.
- The committee recommends the changes to the attached staff job descriptions. (The position descriptions which were changed were Ministry Assistant for Spiritual Growth and Worship, Ministry Assistant for Christian Service, Youth and Family Minister and Music Coordinator. These are available upon request). The committee is confident that these changes will suffice to assure Pastor Corey's former responsibilities are covered.
- The Lead Pastor will have primary responsibility for all areas and assign the ministry leads for them.
- The committee brings to the Council's attention the possibility of staff burnout and recommends:
 - * The Council assures compliance with the Soul Care Policy
 - * The Council forms a "Volunteer Coordination Team" to help raise up congregational volunteers to help with ministry and mission at RLC, relieving

the staff of responsibilities, especially those which could and should be handled by congregants, not staff.

The second committee, Contemporary Music Coordinator (CMC) Search, was formed and simultaneously began their work to find a regular and ongoing Coordinator. Shane Benjamson, Susie McKinney, Mike Bettinson, Janet Budzeck (Council Member), Jenny Page (Staff Member) and I set to work. The first matters of consideration included, working to define and clarify the responsibilities of the newly created position. Formulating interview questions that would be asked of applicants to aid in discerning qualified candidates. And writing a clear and succinct job listing that would serve the purpose of attracting good candidates.

As this work was being done, it came to the committee's attention that there were 2-3 people within the congregation that could easily fill this position. It was the committee's shared opinion that it would be better to hire from within. The decision was made to limit the scope of the posting to internal communication. The listing remained posted for a two week window. The committee received an application from current Interim CMC, Susie Nunamaker, which was the only application received.

The CMC search team contacted Susie and setup an interview. The interview was conducted in person with careful consideration of COVID protocols. The CMC search team split up the questions we had worked on in our previous meetings and asked them in turn. The resulting conversation was informative and spirit led. The interview lasted about an hour. Susie was forthcoming and personable. The team was united in our perspective that she presented as a more than qualified candidate. We ended the interview as we end all of our meetings in prayer and a commitment to continued prayer for guidance from God.

The search team reached a consensus that Susie would be a good fit for this position. It was decided that we should recommend Susie to be put in the position of Contemporary Music Coordinator at the earliest convenience of the Congregation Council. At their December meeting the Congregation Council unanimously approved hiring Susie Nunamaker for this position. The position will be combined with the Traditional Music Coordinator position, already held by Susie.

There you have it! After much consideration, prayer, discernment and work, God has made provision for us as we move into 2021 and beyond. Please join me in extending a warm welcome and congratulations to both Pastor Sam and Susie Nunamaker as they more into their new calling here at Richland Lutheran. I also encourage you to appreciate the rest of the staff here at RLC. Jenny Page, Kelly Westlund, Amanda Daniels, Susan Miller, and Lisa Wiegand round out our great team. I am blessed to be able to ministry with such godly and faithful ministers of the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

Lastly, I thank all of you, our congregation, and the true "priesthood of all believers!"
