Financial Report - February 2015

As reflected in the financial summary below, our financial results for February were similar to the plan. Our offerings are up \$5,290 higher than last year for the same period. Our expenses are down (\$406) compared to the same time last year. Through February, our offerings are below expenses by (\$10,511) compared to (\$16,206) in 2014, a change from last year of \$5,695. These results are reflected in the columns titled "Prior Year Comparison".

From the Council

"Extravagant Generosity" – The practice of giving above and beyond all expectations. These two words can take many forms and, no doubt, have a different look for each of us. It may be giving extravagantly in the form of money, talents, time, love and kindness toward others. Maybe it's all of these and more. Whatever "Extravagant Generosity" may mean to you, God tells us in 2 Corinthians 9:6, "Remember this: whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows generously will also reap generously."

I'd like to take this opportunity to talk about "Extravagant Generosity" in the form of money. Most of us feel, that although we'd like to give more, we give as much as we can. After all, the economy isn't good, we have bills to pay, not much extra income, and so on and so on. By the time you read this, many of us on staff and Council will have completed a course through Dave Ramsey's Financial Peace University (FPU) helping us learn how to better manage or, more accurately, "plan" our personal finances. FPU is a nine-week program that takes us through the "baby steps" that lead to financial peace of mind; the byproduct willingness and eagerness to give more to God. After all, He blessed us with what we have and He wants us to use it in ways that honor Him.

As I began FPU, I felt I was already doing as much as I could towards managing my finances but I learned very quickly that I was on a new and exciting path. God was readying me for a financial attitude change. And, that's really what it is — attitude. A change that would show me how I can help further His Kingdom through better stewardship of my finances so that I can have more comfort in giving generously what He has provided for me. How we handle our finances (and our lives) hinges on where we place our trust — in ourselves or in God. FPU helped me to open my eyes and my heart. It afforded me the opportunity to take a closer look at what I'm now giving to God and consider how I can increase that giving.

As you consider "Extravagant Giving" and what that may look like to you, remember - God was extravagantly generous to us in the gift of His one and only Son, Jesus Christ, who lived, died and rose again for us. What can be more extravagantly generous than that?

President's Perspectives - Decluttering Our Lives

My Year to Declutter — As I approach each new year I try to set goals for my life that year. For 2015 one of the goals I set was to reduce the amount of material things I own. I vowed to get rid of at least one thing each day. It's hard for me to throw things away. My mother will be 97 this year and her character was formed while living through the great depression. She cannot waste or throw away anything and she passed on her values to me.

Carol and I have so many books, that despite many shelves, we have resorted to piles on the floor of the den. Our file cabinets are stuffed with paper. My closet rods are so full of clothes that I have to push hard to get items out or to hang them again. My car has been parked on the street in front of our house for 15 years because we have too much stuff in the garage to park it there. Why do I still have the model railroad I'll never set up again, the film cameras that I will never use again, the black and white darkroom equipment that is not used anymore, the saxophone that I never learned to play? My progress in getting rid of stuff has been slow; some clothes, an old attaché case, a Christmas tree stand, and 25 books is all I have to my credit so far.

Decluttering Our Spiritual Lives – When we have too many material things in our homes there are consequences whether it is having to buy more shelves to store things (or even a storage shed), or losing time when we have to search through piles for something we need.

Just as we pay a penalty for having too many material things we also suffer consequences when we hold onto too much that interferes with our relationship with God.

I am particularly thinking now of how we use our time. Much of our days are spent in activities that are not bad and are often good. Our work is necessary and most often good, but if the emphasis we place on our careers leaves little time for God or our families then it is bad for us spiritually. Cell phones, computers, and Facebook can be ways of being more efficient with our time or keeping contact with others. But if our time with our electronics keeps us from God then it is bad. Sports can be fun and even teach worthy attributes like discipline but they can become our idols, especially in America, that keep us from spending time with God or His ministry.

Jesus, in his parable of the sower, said in Luke 8:14, "The seed that fell among thorns stands for those who hear, but as they go on their way they are **choked by life's worries, riches and pleasures, and they do not mature**." (NIV)

We are each called to be a disciple of Jesus. To follow that call requires us to change our lives and priorities. Jesus must come first in everything. As Jesus said in Luke 14:26 (NIV); "If anyone comes to me and does not hate father and mother, wife and children, brothers and sisters—yes, **even their own life**—such a person cannot be my disciple." Now, he does not mean we are to hate anyone but he uses the extreme contrast to make his point.

The Discipline of Simplicity – In spiritual discipline literature, what I have been talking about is often called the Discipline of Simplicity. It is making our lives less complex by intentionally making decisions by eliminating or cutting back on things that keep us from God.

This month, as you consider a thing to buy, an event to attend, or how you spend your time, first ask yourself this question: "**Does this bring me closer to God and/or people?**"

Bas Soma: Dead Man Walking

Not being in possession of - or finding even internet access to - an ancient Celtic dictionary, I've likely got a misspelled transliterated term in this month's article title. The error is not the important thing, however: the *meaning* of the term/phrase is the essential thing. What I do know is that the pronunciation of it phonetically sounds like: bas (as in bah humbug) and soma (long "o" and short "a"). The definition of the term is simply this: "Have a good death." It was a greeting among the Celts; sort of a melancholy Irish way of saying "goodbye" (which, by the way, is simply a shortened version of the old English phrase "God be with ye"). Don't ask me how I know these things. All I know is that I'm probably less likely to make a mistake in old English than in *modern* English; and I fear I'm literally becoming an *ancient* Celt as I continue to age. This ancient Celtic farewell, was not reserved for someone literally on their deathbed. It was part of an ancient Christian culture expressing itself as an exchanged prayer for one another all through life. I'm composing this during the month of March (St. Patrick's Day!); and it should be (by the grace of Ms. Kelly) published in April (Holy Week and Easter): the way my twisted mind works, there is a connection in pursuing the theme of "Have a good death." I first learned of this term while having the privilege of taking some end-of-life training together with my youngest son (who is a hospice chaplain). We were both impressed enough that it has since become the customary farewell between the two of us.

The above sub-title, of course, is lifted from the best-selling book - and subsequent award-winning movie - authored by Sister Helen Prejean who experienced working with death row prisoners. The term is an announcement as the convicted is escorted from their cell to their execution. Since "...the wages of sin is death..." and "...all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God..." (Romans 6:23 and 3:23, respectively); and, "Surely I was sinful at birth, sinful from the time my mother conceived me..." (Psalm 51:5): we not only have all of our protestations of innocence blown away, but already stand convicted in the courtroom of God's just standards, i.e., every one of us IS a "dead man walking". The writer of Hebrews 9:27 expresses it this way: "...people are destined to die once, and after that to face judgment...", i.e., we're all going to die (believers and unbelievers alike). So far, this is a dim prospect and a real downer of an article.

Even believers have a certain fear of death surely at least as an unknown, or heretofore unexperienced, event. So why did those wacky Celtic believers have such a seemingly dark - yet heartfelt - exchange with one another desiring and encouraging us to "have a good death"? To arrive at the answer, we must learn of another expression the Celtic church taught. It went as follows: "Die before you die, so that when you die, you will not die." This phrase comports well with the teachings of Jesus: "The one who believes in Me will live even though they die; and whoever lives by believing in Me will never die...", "Anyone who loves their life will lose it, while anyone who hates their life in this world will keep it for eternal life..." (John 11:25, 12:25). Hating one's life in this world is nothing less than counting yourself dead - in Christian circles referred to as "death to the self-life". The self-life includes all those terms which follow the word "self": selfishness, self-aggrandizement, self-ambition, self-satisfaction, etc. In other words, the death to the self-life runs counter-culturally to our false philosophy that "it's all about me." The key to this death to the self-life is expressed best by St. Paul in Galatians 2:20 where he writes, "I have been crucified with Christ and I no longer live, but Christ lives in me. The life I now live in the body, I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave Himself for me." To so identify by faith in Christ's death that this verse is real in your life means you'll have died before you die, so that when you die you will not die.

Have a good death!

There's a box in the Prince of Peace fellowship area near the mailboxes to receive the jugs and glue sticks, or you can drop them off to the Sunday school office. Lids can be included with the jugs, and the label does not have to be removed...but please use soap and warm water to wash out the jug extremely well! Half-gallon jugs will work too, we'll just need a lot more of those!


