

## **Extravagant Generosity: Part 2**

"God who supplies seed to the sower and bread will supply and multiply your resources and increase the harvest of your righteousness. You will be enriched in every way for great generosity, which through us will produce thanksgiving to God ..." II Corinthians 9: 10, 11.

On November 29 and 30, Pastor Steve explained how Extravagant Generosity benefits the Church, that is the people, and thus us, in accomplishing God's and our vision by making Christ's name known and furthering His Kingdom. As in many cases, his message made me think. My thoughts wondered to how generous giving to the work of the RLC Foundation fits into that vision. So I got his approval to do a little plagiarizing.

Some of you might ask, "What in the world is the RLC Foundation." Let me tell you. The congregation at an annual meeting started the Foundation in 1987 as a separate 501 (c) (3) corporation. They made voting members of Richland Lutheran Church also voting members of the Foundation.

The RLC Foundation plants seeds for new ministries that are nourished by others to become full-fledged ministries that praise God and give Him glory. Thus, these seeds stir others to do good deeds to the glory of God and ultimately provide sharing and leading others to Christ.

Examples of some of the Foundation ministry seeds that you may be familiar with that have matured include G-3 (1999)/mid-week Super Kids!, an opportunity for family night; Prayer Ministry (2008), practical teaching for developing people's prayer life; God Sightings Bibles and aids (2009), drawing people into the Bible at their own pace; the Gedde Lecture Series (2010), bringing theological speakers to the Tri-Cities; Neighborhood Ministry (2011), reaching out to our immediate neighbors and showing that we care for them and want to know them better; Jefferson School Tutoring Ministry (2012), assisting volunteers to enter a partnership with teachers and administrators in helping students improve their skills and confidence levels; and the Cornerstone Fund Jump Start (2013), funds provided on a donation matching basis.

Planting these seeds are possible through your generous giving to the Foundation because the funds used result from the income earned by investing your donations; only the income is used so your donation remains as principal and can multiply by generating funds for future use.

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### From Pastor Steve



DID YOU KNOW...Christians celebrate both life and death at Christmas? At least we ought to. As I write this article I'm in the midst of planning Kay Aase's memorial service. Kay, a beloved member of Richland Lutheran and a dear friend of mine and many, died the previous Sunday. In fact, Christmas can be a very difficult time of year for many because of the remembrances of lives lost in years' past during this season and the highlighted absence of our loved ones at family gatherings and celebrations. Honestly, I find myself feeling less than "joyful, joyful" these days as I prepare, yet again, to say goodbye to a fellow member of our church and loving friend. Having had to say goodbye to so many these past months, Bill Eller, Millie Volkman, Ken Kenton, Roy Hibbard,

Jean Moore, Pete and Edie Lakey, Kay Mesford, Shirley Riley, and most recently Cloyde Hardman, I'm feeling a bit worn. Perhaps you are too. It's become difficult to find the joy in Christmas this year.

But God is teaching me something new. In my morning quiet time with Jesus, He's been teaching me, by His Spirit of grace, to understand Christmas as both a celebration of life and a celebration of death. The first, a celebration of life, is easy to come by and understand. We celebrate the life of Jesus the Christ begun in the manger, incarnate (God made flesh), Immanuel (God with us). The second, a celebration of death, is not as easy to get our heads around. But indeed, I believe it's there in the Christmas story.

Jesus himself said in the Gospel of John the tenth chapter, "I have come that they may have life, and have it to the full. I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep." These two verses, ten and eleven, give testimony to the truth Christmas is about the celebration of both life and death. Verse ten speaks clearly to the celebration of life, "I have come that they may have life, and have it to the full." But Jesus doesn't stop there even though many times we do. For its much easier to celebrate life; the life of Jesus, the life of loved ones, our own life, than it is to celebrate death. Duh! With statements like these I'm sure to win the "Master of the Obvious" award. Mom will be so proud!

Verse eleven, I've come to believe, speaks to the celebration of death, "I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep." It may feel uncomfortable to talk about celebrating death but that is indeed what we do as those who believe Jesus' death on the cross paid for our sins giving us salvation and eternal life itself. What Jesus is really saying here is, "I, the good shepherd, have come to lay down my life for my sheep," isn't it? Doesn't this give greater meaning to Jesus' coming? Not only did Jesus come to live, He came to die. In the manger we see Jesus coming to life, coming to death, death on a cross. The manger and the cross cannot, must not, be separated!

So then, it is because of Christmas, the birth of Jesus, we celebrate both life and death. The life of Jesus and the abundant and eternal life he gives us and the death of Jesus and our own death which leads to life! Paul says this clearly in Romans 6, "Now if we died with Christ, we believe that we will also live with him." Did you see it just there, the Hope of God, our reason to celebrate death, a glimpse of joy? Kay, Bill, Millie, Ken, Roy, Jean, Pete and Edie, Kay, Shirley, Cloyde, have died with Christ, the one come in the manger to go to the cross, and now live with him. Though we miss them dearly, this is certainly worth celebrating! Merry Christmas!



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### Financial Report - November 2014

As reflected in the financial summary below, our financial results through November are reflecting a positive trend as we end the calendar year. Our offerings are up \$25,996 or 4.0% higher than last year for the same period. Our expenses are up \$5,539 or .8% higher than the same time last year. For the year, our offerings are below expenses by \$(31,552) compared to (\$52,009) in 2013, a change from last year of \$20,458. These results are reflected in the columns titled "Prior Year Comparison".

For the year, actual offerings are below budget by \$(61,386) and actual expenses are under budget by \$(59,762).

As a reminder, this year's approved budget is 9.8% higher than last year's actual offerings. For your reference, our average planned offerings/income per week is approximately \$16,150. Through the month of November, our actual weekly average of offerings/income is \$14,086, or (\$2,064) under plan per week.

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### **Presidents' Perspectives - A New Year**

The end of a year and the beginning of a new one is always a time to reflect on how I've spent my time and money and how I can improve in the future. I have been totally retired from a job for pay for five years now and that has opened up many opportunities for me. I can spend more time in my devotional life, I can read more (over 175 books in 2014), exercise more regularly, and have more time for volunteer service.

When you elected me as your President for 2014-2015 I sat down and set some goals specifically for that office for 2014. I try to set very objective, measureable goals; no "enhance", "improve", or "leverage" language for me. I set goals in five different areas and this December took time to evaluate the successes and failures and how to do better in 2015.

**Prayer** - I had resolved to pray for Richland Lutheran Church by praying for Pastor Steve daily, for one other staff member each week, for a Council member weekly, and for congregation members as needed. I've done well on Pastor Steve, staff members, and Council members but need to do more on praying for members and want to specifically add ministries to my list for 2015. I'd rate my performance a B in this area.

**Communications** - I wanted to improve communications with you and the staff. The ways I resolved to do this was by attending at least monthly a staff meeting, meeting regularly with Pastor Steve, writing monthly PREVIEW articles for you, and to give more recognition through personal notes or in the PREVIEW for contributions made by members, especially those working behind the scenes. I now attend staff meetings every week, if in town, and have continued this monthly article in the PREVIEW. Meeting with Pastor Steve regularly did not happen. I started the year writing thank you notes but by July started letting that slip. I want to do better on this because I know how encouraging notes have been to me in the past. I would grade myself as B.

**Council Meeting Content -** The goals in this area were to increase our time in devotions and prayer, get materials to be discussed out to Council members a week in advance, segregate action items from information items and put information items nearer the end to make sure we got the action items done, get Council members involved in ministry areas, and to be advocates for those areas, and to feature a ministry area each month. An A- performance here. Not all materials are getting out a week in advance but everything else has been working.

**Expand Congregation Ministry Involvement** — Goals here were to help fill all ministry team leader positions with lay people, develop a data base of volunteers, and publicize ministry volunteer needs through the PREVIEW and possibly a bulletin board posting position descriptions for needed volunteers. The staff has made some progress here but personally I have only found one person to fill a needed position. This is an area that really needs emphasis. I give myself a D.

**Encourage Improvements in Ministries** — The ministry areas I picked to improve were those I have a special heart for: expanding (not too specific there) the number of spiritual formation small groups, implementing the Alpha program, holding an information meeting on local Hispanics' social justice issues, having at least three adult education choices each quarter, and completing the architect's Strategic Facility Plan. None of these were implemented so I must give myself a grade of F.

As I look forward to 2015 I want to meet all of these goals before my term ends in December 2015. I thank the congregation for their trust in me by giving me these opportunities. 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### Return to the Routine

Ah (!) January: it doesn't stand a chance. How do you follow the unusual acts of celebration in December? Now we return to what, in the northern hemisphere, is the coldest month of the year. If it snows this month, it will not evoke the same heartwarming winter scene it did in December (excepting avid skiers - and delighted school children hoping for school closures.) In January, my Dad would come into the house, to warm up from sub-zero temperatures, stomping yet more fresh snow off of his boots, removing ice from his face and mittens, peering though fogged glasses, snow shovel in hand, declaring: "I hate wintah!" He reserved the disdainful pronunciation "wintah" for the continuation of winter - which in Minnesota would usually prove to be lengthy. Regardless of the fact of winter's ravages being considerable lessened in our locale of Washington, prolongation of the season still bears the ho-hum stigma of return to our normal routines of life. Gone are the bell-ringing greeters, smiling faces, lovely indoor party get-togethers with friends, wonderful special church programs and choral events which occupied our attention during Advent and Christmas. Now we return to school and work (and church!?) perhaps in an attitude of "same old, same old"/"business as usual" mostly without interruption in routine until Easter. This malaise in church apparently doesn't affect its C.E.O.'s (referring to attendance patterns of the crowd known as the "Christmas, Easter, Only" bunch). January is the doldrums!

Without negating seasons of special events, I speak in favor of the regularity of routine. The breakfast I eat every day is a candlelit meal consisiting of: various and sundry pills (known as "the black hole of medicine") prescribed for/foisted upon me to treat diabetes and prevent medical matters which could arise out of that malady; a bowl of Smart Bran<sup>TM</sup> (with a bit of cinnamon and a sweetener called Truvia<sup>TM</sup>) in skim milk; a large glass of water; a small glass of sugar-free cranberry juice; 2 cups of some variety of green tea - with a pinch of local honey (to stave off allergies); 1 small orange; shredded and seasoned hash browns (I prefer them burned) with 1 over-easy egg on top of them; 1 turkey link sausage; a nearly burned (by request) English muffin - with spread and sugar -free jam on it. It all ends with 1 small Russel Stover<sup>TM</sup>sugar-free toffee square and 2 small yogurt-covered pretzels! This breakfast may not sound good for a diabetic: but there are ingredients in it (like cinnamon) which are very good for the disease; and it gives me great blood sugar readings with enough protein to sustain me in case I get stretched out over the noon hour (an occupational hazard). Elaine is a great cook; but we laugh about not being able to recall what we ate at lunch or supper. Her meal I remember is my healthy, great-tasting, sustaining breakfast.

For spiritual sustenance, Elaine and I twice daily practice marital devotions (we also practice personal devotions, but *that's* a subject for another article.) This is healthy and sustaining for our marriage in relationship with Christ. Morning and evening for several years now, we've followed the format of *Celtic Daily Prayer*; reading the daily Scripture passages suggested, from two different translations (currently, the *Christian Standard Version* and *The Voice*.) It's all there: confession, professions of faith, Scripture, prayers; and, we sing seasonal hymns in accord with the liturgical calendar. Sound like twice daily worship services? It is - minus the sermon and the offering! Then, at the weekly corporate service of worship, even those missing elements get added. What could be *more* extraordinary than the *regular* affirmations of the Lord's Prayer, the Apostles'/Nicene Creed, and participation in that *memorable* meal of communion!!! The liturgical calendar's lengthiest season follows Pentecost; in Church history it's called "*Ordinary Time*". But what could be *ordinary* about life with Christ, and in His Church, experienced in the empowerment of the Spirit of Pentecost? Make such routines sustain *you* this year, and your life will *never* be routine again! **Hebrews 10:22-25.**


