Facilities Building Committee Update

Becoming Engaged in RLC's August 30 Decision

On August 30, our congregation will determine whether Meier Architecture and Engineering will base our Facilities Strategic Plan on a "Remodel" design concept or a "Rebuild" design concept. We have already paid Meier to develop the Facilities Strategic Plan using one of these concepts. We just need to tell Meier which concept makes the most sense for our existing and future ministries.

The "Remodel" concept includes reconfigured existing interior space, additions, and a new façade for our fellowship building; as well as repurposed sanctuary office space. The "Rebuild" concept would see our current fellowship building removed and replaced with an efficient new building. In both a "Remodel" and a "Rebuild," our rentals would be replaced by a new parking lot.

In October 2013, our congregation approved an RLC Long Range Plan, which includes a Facilities Strategic Plan. As stated in the Long Range Plan, the purpose of the Facilities Strategic Plan is to ensure that our facilities support our ministries and keep them viable. Our Council approved Meier to develop the Facilities Strategic Plan in May 2014.

There are several ways you can prepare yourself for the upcoming August 30 decision. Most importantly, pray that God leads us. You can also attend a foursession workshop series to gain information. The first series will be held Sundays after the second service July 12, 19, 26, and August 2. A repeat series will be held Wednesday evenings from 6:30 to 8:00 p.m. August 5, 12, 19, and 26. You can study enlargements of the "Remodel" and "Rebuild" design concepts displayed in the Prince of Peace starting July 12, or take home 11"x17" prints to study. You can find RLC's Needs Assessment, Programming Report, Ministry Plan, and Long Range Plan — as well as Facilities Building Committee information products — online or in the Prince of Peace. You can talk to a Committee member.

Find a way to become *engaged* in the facility upgrade process. Don't miss out on this tremendous and exciting opportunity! We are a mission church, builders of benevolent ministries and the facilities that support them, and fishers of men making the Gospel of Jesus Christ known to others.

Financial Update - May 2015

As reflected in the financial summary below, our financial results through May is on plan and slightly behind last year for the same period. Our offerings are down (\$16,225) compared to the same time last year. Our expenses are down (\$11,671) compared to the same time last year. Through May, our offerings are below expenses by (\$30,828) compared to (\$26,274) in 2014, a change from last year of \$4,554. These results are reflected in the columns titled "Prior Year Comparison".



Through May, our offerings were below budget by \$35,828, and our expenses were below budget by \$34,649. To date, our offerings are below expenses by (\$30,828). Compared to our budget (\$29,619), we are slightly below plan by \$1,209. Note: We are now heading into the summer months, where historically our average giving is less than the other times of the year.





- 6. I am excited about the direction our church staff and leadership are going and the fact that my three kiddos get to grow up in our church family.

President's Perspectives - Summer Reading

Life-Changing Books - Summer is here and vacations have started. Are you looking for something a bit more substantial than a mystery to read in the car, on the beach, or up in the woods? (And I do love a good mystery!) The Bible, of course, is number one when it comes to developing our relationship with God or instructing us in how to live our lives. But often God uses other books to bring us closer to Him or to inspire us to change our lives.

In my twenties and thirties books by C.S. Lewis, Francis Schaeffer, Elton Trueblood, Frank Laubach, and Dietrich Bonhoeffer were especially helpful to me. More recently I have been finding the most depth in books by Dallas Willard, John Stott, N. T. Wright, James Bryan Smith, and Timothy Keller.

Our Love for God - Jesus told us that loving God is the primary and most important commandment so developing our relationship with God should always come first. Some of my all time favorite books in this category include:

- *Mere Christianity* by C.S. Lewis an extremely easy read that can help us see why Christianity makes sense and that Jesus must be either the Son of God as he said he was, a devil or a deluded person. He can't be just a good moral teacher to be admired.
- **Practicing His Presence** by Brother Lawrence and Frank Laubach This book had the most profound impact on my ideal of our relationship with God and I wish everyone would read it. An easy, short book with entries from Laubach's journal, it documents his attempts to bring Christ into his thoughts at least once every minute.
- *Prayer: Experiencing Awe and Intimacy with God* by Timothy Keller not much explanation needed. Help with conversing with God.
- *The Divine Conspiracy* by Dallas Willard covers both loving God and love of your neighbor.

Our Love for Neighbors - The second command is to love your neighbor as yourself, which can only be truly done if you have obeyed the first commandment. Helpful books at defining what love of our neighbors really means, include the following:

- The Message of the Sermon on the Mount by John Stott.
- **The Good and Beautiful Community** by James Bryan Smith, part of a three volume set on Christian life.
- **Generous Justice** by Timothy Keller.
- *Involvement* by John Stott, a two volume set on being a responsible Christian in a non-Christian world. These are the books I recommend today for inspiration and challenges that could change your life. I'm a reader. What books have you found especially helpful in your life?

The Mouths of Babes and the Motions of Grandfathers

The few who mentioned my column was absent in last month's *Preview* are perhaps gladdened to see its return. The rest either don't care, didn't notice, or assumed I failed to slip Ms. Kelly enough candy/gum in order to influence an inclusion. In fact, there wouldn't have been enough confectionary influence to accomplish that because I simply didn't submit an article! Whatever inclinations I have toward procrastination or laziness: the root cause of my failure is with May through September being a sequence of months which, in our family, include a number of our birthdays, anniversaries, and holidays - occasions to gather for fellowship and celebration of those and that with which God has blessed our clan. For 45 years I've, too often, allowed church obligations to preclude participation in those events. In my newfound ministry of "irresponsibility" (I'm discovering the truth of the old adage that ministers are never allowed to retire until serious health deterioration or death), I'm at least/last allowed the privilege of sorts of picking and choosing my own ministry involvements. Given that all of our children - and most of our grandchildren - reside on the west side of the state; and the aforementioned months mean you're not the victim of pass reports, we find ourselves in a stretch to make up for years of lost time and attend most of these events. So, the absence of this column wasn't an example of absent-mindedness, instead an example of just plain being absent to be present with our family.

Only with family does one become privy to conversations such as my son, Kyle, had with 7-year old daughter, Lydia, wherein he asked her, "How come you're so cute?", with her immediate response, "when I grow up to be an adult what happens to the cuteness? It fades away!" It'd be a shame to miss out on wisdom from a little girl. Or perhaps I'd miss out on the wise observations of her 9-year old sister, Linnea, who opined after watching a group of 9th grade girls fawning over her 12-year old brother, Micah: that one of them would make a good wife for him, because she talked so much that Micah could barely get one-word answers out. The context is that owing to his giftedness, he always injects himself in the midst of adult conversations - holding his own; but betraying his youth, by proceeding to dominate the conversation. A recent example of this was Micah off in the corner with a family friend who has his doctorate in history and is the head of that department at one of the local universities: fully engaged in conversation about history. I'm gaining insight into Joseph and Mary's alarm to discover Jesus baffling the theologians in the Temple at Micah's age. Seem like grandparental bragging? No, I think it's typical grandparental marvel over one's grandchildren, wherein we ask God with wonder: "What shall this one grow up to be? (as in Luke 1:66). Any grandparents among us who haven't had similar thoughts about each of our own grandchildren? I thought so.

Whatever they'll be and achieve (underachieve?) in life - swelling our pride, or breaking our hearts - they'll likely grow up to be bumbling grandparents in their own right. Recently I was theatrically reading a book to 3-year old Benjamin on his parents' sofa: and his 2-year old brother, Gilbert, wanted in on the action. I'm instructed to move over to allow him to sit on my other side. Providing space for him, while holding the sharp-cornered book in the opposite hand, I'm unaware that Benjamin isn't paying attention. It ends with me poking Benjamin in the eye with the book's corner, his calamitous bawling, and consequent glares from his grandma, as I've injured the child. This grandfather comes with a warning label: hazardous to your health! "...The LORD's love is with those who fear Him, and His righteousness with their children's children - those who keep His covenant and remember to obey His precepts." (Psalm 103:17b-18) "From the lips of children and infants You, LORD, have called forth your praise." (Matthew 21:16)


